Risley, on the East Side Railway line, just opposite Oswego. He placed the muzzle of a revolver to the roof of his mouth, the bullet piercing the brain and coming out through the top of the skull.

W. T. Scholl was 65 years old and came to Oregon in 1846 with his parents from Illinois, the father settling at a point in Washington county known as Scholl's ferry. He accumulated some property, in the way of houses and lots, and for a long time past has done no active work beyond looking after his property and his tenants.
