Oregon City Schools.

The Oregon City schools will resume work next Monday. Under the organization of the schools, as instituted by the board, Prof. L. W. McAdam will be city principal and have charge of all the schools with his office in the Barclay building. The only class work that he will do will be to hear the recitations of the tenth grade. The assignment of teachers as made by Supt. McAdam is as follows: Barclay school—J. C. Zinser, ninth grade; Gertrude Finley, eighth; Addie Clark, sixth and seventh; Gertrude Nefzger, fourth and fifth; Laura Beattie, third; Hattie Cochran, second; May Kelly, first.

Died. QUMBY—At his home in Viola on Tuesday, September 6, 1897, Rev. George W. Quimby, aged 55 years, 7 months and 4 days.

Decedent was born in LaSalle county, Illinois, February 2, 1842. At the age of 18 he moved with his parents to Missouri, where when 19 years old he enlisted in a company of artillery and fought bravely in defense of his country until the close of the war. He was converted at the age of 16 and joined the Methodist church, South, entering the ministry in 1867. He came to Oregon in 1883 and changed from the M. E. church, South, to the M. E. church, North, in 1889. He was pastor at Wilbur for two years and served faithfully at Myrtle Point for three years, where he organized a church. He also labored at Marshfield two years, and was just closing two years' successful service at Viola, when he was called upon to lay down life's burden and enter upon "the rest that remaineth for the people of God."

Mr. Quimby's health began to fail some two years ago, but he labored on persistently in spite of ill health and fatigue and never took to his bed until the second Sunday in May. He rallied afterwards but was never able to preach again. He went to the Portland hospital, employed some of the best physicians in the state and made a heroic fight for his life but without avail. His beloved wife and his venerable father, Rev. J. M. Quimby, who was 82 years old the day his son died, and who has been preaching for the past 65 years, and his son, Frank, of Sacramento, California, were present at his bedside and untiring in their ministrations of love.

The funeral services were held at the Methodist church in this city on Wednesday afternoon, conducted by Rev. T. L. Jones. The interment was in the Masonic cemetery.
