A FLAX FIBRE MILL.—The scutching mill plant for the Salem flax fibre mill arrived today and is being placed in position at the old frame flouring mills on North Front street. The plant will be driven by water power, and is being set up by Wheelwright Dawthort, of the Salem flouring mills.

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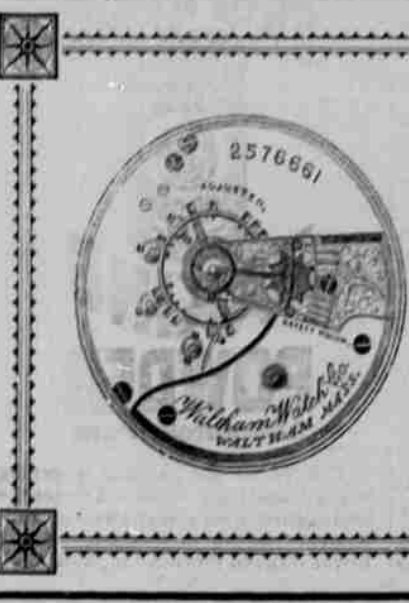
