Fireproof Rope.

Canadian and Italian asbestus will find a serious competitor in the blue asbestus recently discovered in the Cape Colony, since the South African product is less than half as heavy and furnishes fibers considerably finer and longer than any other. The South African fiber has been worked into webs, which are but little inferior to those made of vegetable fiber and are absolutely fireproof. Twine, cord and rope made of this blue asbestus will not only resist fire, but also most of the known chemicals, corresive vapors and atmospheric influences. These qualities will open a new field for the employment of asbestus fabrics in chemical laboratories and for the calking of chemical apparatus.

In order to test the resistance of the new material a blue asbestus rope of about three-fourths of an inch in diameter was weighted at one end with 220 pounds and exposed to a constant flame from a large gas jet, so that the rope for a considerable length was surrounded by fire. The cord only broke after 22 hours. Still it was a trifle lighter than a rope of the same diameter made of Russian hemp. Compared with a new hemp rope, the asbestus rope has twothirds of its strength, but as the ropes get older the proportion is altered in favor of asbestus ropes, since they suffer but very little from the influences of the atmosphere.

Another novel application of this material is the working of blue asbestus fiber into mattresses for hospitals. They are cooler in summer and warmer in winter than these made either of animal hair or vegetable fiber, and no vermin can live in this mattress. Experiments are now being made of working this fiber into cloth for firemen's apparel. Of course the long fiber of blue asbestus can also be employed for all the uses to which white asbestus has been put heretofore. While a trifle more expensive, its superior qualities made it well worth the difference.-Philadelphia Record.

Indian Medicine Bags,

The medicine bags of Navajoes, Zunia and Apaches, all kindred tribes in New Mexico and Arizona, contain a curious powder, known as corn pollen or hoddentin. This powder, which is the pollen of a rush, and also of maize, appears to be used as a medicine, being eaten by the sick and put on the head or other parts to ease pain, but principally as a sacred offering to the sun and moon and as a sanctifier of everything. A pinch of it is thrown toward the sun and then toward the four winds for help in war or the chase, is put on the trail of a snake to prevent harm from it, placed on the tongue of the tired hunter as a restorative, hung in bags round the necks of infants as a preservstive and sprinkled on the dead. In fact, every action of these Indians is sanctified by this powder, so that, as Captain Bourke writes in the ninth volume of 'The Report of the Bureau of Ethnology" (Smithsonian), "plenty of hoddentin has come to mean that a particular performance or place is sa-cred."

Captain Bourke shows many analogies to the use of this sacred powder both in the east and among the ancient Greeks and Romans, and it is clear that similar practices with regard to "medicine"-that is, magic-have prevailed everywhere and in all ages, for superstition seems to be the universal heritage of man, so deeply ingrained in his very nature that all the efforts of phi-losophers and "thirteen" clubs will not avail to root it out. Medicine bags or amulets will continue to be worn openly or secretly not only by the wild Indian and the Kaffir, but by many among ourselves who cling to the beliefs handed down probably from remote prehistoric ages. - Chambers' Journal.

COMMERCIAL FERTILIZERS.

Thirags Farmers Ought to Know Before dipplying Them.

The prine al leature of a farmers' Lucietin on commercial fertilizers by E. B Voorhees are brought out in the following summary:

Commercial fertilizers are mainly valuable because they furnish the elements-nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash-which serve as food, not as stimulants. The kind of farming in the past and the demands for special products in the present make their use necessary in profitable farming.

In order to use these commercial fertilizers profitably the farmer should know, first, that nitrogen, phosphoric form; third, that these forms are contained in specific products of a well defined character and composition, and may be purchased as such from dealers and manufacturers, and may be mixed successfully on the farm.

The agricultural value of a fertilizer bears no strict relation to the commercial value. The one is determined by soil, crop and climatic conditions, the other by market conditions.

The variations in the compostion and value of manufactured fertilizers which contain the three essential constituents are due to variations in the character and in the propertion of the materials

The ton basis alone is not a safe guide in the purchase of these commercial fertilizers. Low ton prices mean either low content of good forms of plant food or the use of poorer forms. Fertilizers, high grade both in quality and quantity of plant food, cannot be purchased at a w price per ton.

The best fertilizers cannot exert their full effect on soils that are too dry or too wet, too compact or too porcus. They can furnish but one of the conditions-fertility.

The kind and amount of fertilizer to use should be determined by the value of the crop grown and its power of acquiring food.

A definite system or plan should be adopted in the use of commercial fertilizers. "Hit or miss methods are expensive.

The Single Shovel Plow.

I have helped to plow hundreds of acres of potatoes with an old fashioned single shovel plow, and there is no modern farm implement that does as satisfactory work in clayey leams or clays that have been packed by beating rains after being planted. This old implement has been practically discarded growers here for many years, but some have returned to its use this seaand the slow work with it will pay, if any work in growing potatoes pays this year. When the plants showed above ground, the practice formerly was to run close to the row with a long and very narrow shovel, the plow stock being held at such an angle that the point of the shovel actually went under the hills.

The soil in the rows is solid in many fields this year, packed by incessant rain, and no modern cultivator can be set that the earth in the rows may be loosened so well as it is done with the single shovel, taking one side of the row at a time. If the shovels of a two horse cultivator were set at the angle we used to hold the single shovel, they would lift the plants out. Two acres a day was called a day's work, and this seems slow, but the plant started life above ground with loose soil in the hill, no matter how packed rains had made it after planting, and loose soil in the hill is a necessity in successful potato

The Value of Cow Manure.

Cow manure does not beat quickly. It is therefore not in favor for forcing beds or for crops where early results are important. For this reason it ought always to be partly composted, so as to reduce its bulk before it is used. It is excellent to mix with manure from the horse stable, because the latter, being drier, is much more likely to become "fire fanged" from the entire destruction of its vegetable fiber. Yet in actual value the slower cow manure is more nearly equal to horse manure than is generally supposed.
