CHURCH DEDICATION.—The neat and commodious church edifice of the German Lutheran denomination on the corner of Eighth and J. Q. Adams street is rapidly nearing completion and it is expected now that the dedicatory services will be held Sunday, November 14, when a number of the leading preachers of this denomination on the coast will be present and deliver addresses, among them being Rev. A. Krause, of Portland, Rev. J. F. Doeschler, of Tacoma, Rev. Beuchler, of Peninsular and Rev. H. Wittrock, of Beaver Creek.

THE RIVER.—Owing to some needed repairs to her boiler valve, the steamer Ramono remained at Salem Monday but resumed her tri-weekly trips to Portland Tuesday morning—going down Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, and returning on Wednesdays, Fridays and Mondays. The Altona ran into a rock near Sellwood a few mornings ago, causing some damage to her hull and necessitating her being hauled onto the ways for repairs.

OREGON LIME-STONE.—D. W. Reidle will leave next week for Southern Oregon, where he has leased a large deposit of lime rock near Oakland and goes to superintend the working of his quarry. He will erect kilns and make hydraulic lime for the present, but expects later to make cement. The tests that have been made from this deposit indicates that it will make a grade equal to the Portland cement.

A HARVEST FESTIVAL.—The harvest festival conducted at the Congregational church last Sunday evening was greatly enjoyed by an audience that filled the house to overflowing. The main auditorium was finely decorated with grain, grasses and flowers and the singing and other exercises by the children were unusually good.

NEW SCHOOL TO OPEN.—The directors of school district, No. 34, on the West Side, have employed Marjorie Caulfield to teach a primary school for Bolton, in accordance with their action taken several weeks ago, made necessary by the distance the small children have to walk to get to the West Side school and the condition of the roads during the winter month. The school will be held in a building originally erected for a store. Miss Caulfield is a graduate of the Oregon City high school and will doubtless make a successful teacher.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY SHINGLES.—H. G. Dodge has moved his shingle mill from Liberal to J. G. Fehler's place, four miles east of Oregon City, where he has secured a fine body of timber and commenced sawing shingles the first of the week. Shelly and Russell delivered loads Tuesday to Geo. Braughton, who is agent for some of the largest saw mill men in Portland. Mr. Dodge has a well earned reputation for manufacturing only first class shingles and has no difficulty of disposing of all he can turn out.

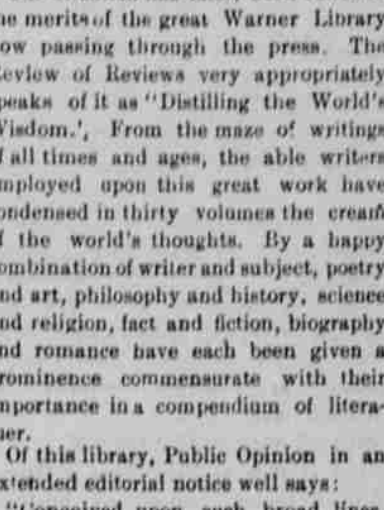
