## The First Oregonian Newshy.

Hon. John Miller Murphy, of Olympia, accompanied by his daughter, Miss Bertha, was in Oregon City Monday the guests of Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Pillsbury, Mr. Murphy being a cousin of Mrs. Pillsbury. Mr. Murphy is one of the veteran newspapermen of the Pacific coast, and his life is a part of the history of Oregon and Washington journalism. When a boy Mr. Murphy had the honor of being the first carrier for the Oregonian, making his rounds with the entire edition of the daily under his arm. During 1858 and '59 he lived in Oregon City and was a compositor in the office of the Argus, the predecessor of the Enterprise. In June 1859 he went to Vancouver and established the Chronicle and removed to Olympia where he lived in that city. At the end of three months he sold the Chronicle and founded the Standard, and for the almost 40 years since that date he has been the editor of the Standard and has made it one of the leading papers of Washington and a power in the democratic party, whose fortunes he has shared through prosperity and adversity, until his party was swamped by the populist wave which swept over his state last year, leaving Mr. Miller with a lot of other democratic patriots to mourn because their party was not. Notwithstanding the grief and disappointment that has come to Mr. Murphy by reason of the dismemberment of his party, after he had given it a loyal devotion for nearly half a century, he is yet a very pleasant, companionable man and is a typical newspaperman in the unbowed and unbroken of his beloved party of sainted memory.

**PAQUET.**—At her home in Oregon City, on Tuesday, October 26, 1897, Florence E. Paquet, aged 24 years, 3 months and 18 days.

The funeral services were held Thursday 2 o'clock p. m. under the auspices of Pioneer Chapter, Eastern Star, of which Miss Paquet was a highly respected member. A simple but impressive song service constituted the exercises at the home, the full Masonic ceremony for that degree was rendered in all its beauty and solemnity at cemetery. The remains were laid at rest in the Masonic cemetery by the side of those of her father whose death took place two years ago. There were many beautiful floral tributes and a large number of friends were present at the exercises to show their regard and affection for a friend whose memory they cherished as one in whom they and the world had sustained a deep and irreplaceable loss.

Miss Paquet was the daughter of Mrs. Sarah Paquet and the late Peter Paquet and was a young lady of much promise and had every indication of becoming a woman who would do her full part to make the world better for having lived in it. Some three years ago she was stricken with consumption and despite everything that medical skill and the loving thoughtfulness of a mother and other members of the family could do she gradually failed in strength until her young life went out peacefully and quietly as she was the fair October day when she bade a last fond farewell to the ties that bound her to earth and her spirit took its flight to the great beyond.
