STATE NEWS NOTES

Items of Interest From All Parts of Oregon.

Making Sorghum in Yamhill County—Cattle Shipments From Eastern Oregon, Etc.

A peculiar story comes from Heppner to the effect that Lilly Henderson, the 15-year old daughter of Mrs. J. W. Vaughan, had left home, alleging cruel and inhuman treatment on the part of her mother, claiming that she had been beaten until she fainted for keeping company with a young man against her parent's wishes.

William J. Smith, of Matney Flat, in Gilliam county, takes the lead so far in receiving the top price for sheep, says the Condon Globe. He sold to Jack Biehl last week all of his sheep, 1070 head of ewes and lambs, for \$3 per head, but has to furnish them range and hay until next June.

Mr. Z. J. Innes, of Dundee, Yamhill county, has made 65 gallons of sorghum this year as an experiment. The article is said to be of excellent quality and bears a very close resemblance to the old reliable sorghum made in the East.

A few cattle deals have occurred lately in the South end of Umatilla county. The most important trade was made by Sam George with a buyer from Dakota. He sold his entire band of stock cattle, cows, calves and yearlings, being about 250 head, says the East Oregonian.

Joseph Baird, a well-known citizen of Gilliam county, was found dead near the doorstep of his home near Arlington on Thursday morning of last week. Mr. Baird was a bachelor and lived alone.

The killing of Coolidge by the Van Pelt at Clonco, Curry county, has thrown that community into a fever of excitement. The father of the murdered man, who lives at Silverton, Marion county, has offered a reward of \$50 for the arrest and conviction of the various members of the Van Pelt party, who are accused of the murder.

The poultry raisers of Lane and Linn counties met at Eugene last Saturday and effected an organization, to be known as the Willamette Poultry Association, the purpose being to encourage the development of the poultry business.

Peter Rafferty, an Indian, was paroled out of the penitentiary at Salem last Friday. He was from the Grand Ronde reservation, and had served the greater portion of a five year sentence for manslaughter.

Heppner has a new paper, the Heppner Times, the first issue of which was sent out last Friday. The promoter of the new venture is E. M. Stutt, formerly of the Antelope Herald.

The Oregon agricultural college football team defeated the state university team at Eugene last Saturday by a score of 24 to 8.

Captain W. F. Daniels and crew of the wrecked steamer Truckee arrived at Marshfield last Friday afternoon after having been rescued by the lifesaving crew the day previous.
