Began Monday—Will Last About Two Weeks.

Grand Jury Drawn—Many Cases Brought up—Nothing Sensational So Far.

Judge McBride convened the April term of the Circuit Court Monday morning, and the same Court officers that have done duty heretofore are at their posts. They are T. J. Cleeton, District Attorney; C. Nellie Fuller vs Albert Fuller; decree of divorce on the plea of desertion. State vs E. E. Martin; owing to the fact that Mr. Martin was sick with the measles, his case was postponed until June. The Grand jury made their final report and were discharged Thursday. They found a true bill against Walter Wyland upon a transcript from the Justice court. The docket is the lightest for a number of years, and court will probably adjourn Tuesday or Wednesday.

Parson's Orchestra. The program of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua Assembly, to be held in Gladstone Park, July 12-23, this year, is nearly completed and will be issued on May 1. It has been decided to make some changes in the order of daily exercises which it is believed will add to the interest and success of the Assembly. From 8 to 11 each forenoon will be devoted to classes, and from 11 to 12 will be college hour, during which the college to which the hour is allotted will be responsible for the program. From 1:30 to 3:30 each afternoon will be occupied by music by the orchestra, a popular lecture, and by the grand Chautauqua chorus, under the direction of Prof. R. A. Heritage. Athletics and games will occupy the time from 2:30 to 5 P. M. when the Round Table will have its hour. At 7:30 there will be an orchestral concert to be followed by a lecture of entertainment to close the evening. Solos, quartettes, readings and other attractions of high order will have their places on the program. Parson's orchestra has been secured to play each afternoon and evening and the Portland Y. M. C. A. has been engaged to take charge of the physical culture, athletics and games which is a sufficient guarantee of the excellence of this feature of the Assembly.

Potatoes for Texas. J. R. Marks, of the firm of Hurst & Marks, Aurora, shipped three car-loads of potatoes from Oswego Saturday to the Texas market. The price paid to growers is 20 cents per bushel. The market is slack on potatoes and commission merchants at New Orleans, where this firm have been shipping, refuse to take any more at any price. However, they are buying all the potatoes they can get and shipping the same to Texas. The potatoes on this side of the river have nearly all been marketed, but there are considerable quantities still in the hands of the growers on the West side of the river.
