Was Quite a Success—It Surpassed the Average Expectation.

CIRCUIT COURT CONTINUED.

Martin and Weyland will Receive their Dues.

The following proceedings were had since the last issue of the Enterprise: The grand jury returned a true bill against L. Dak for burning a hop house last December. Following is the grand jury report made Thursday:

GRAND JURY REPORT.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Clackamas. To the Hon. T. A. McBride, judge of the above named court:

We undersigned members of the grand jury for the April 1898 term of said court, beg leave to the submit this our final report. We have inquired into all matters of crime brought before us and have returned into court two true bills and one not a true bill. We have also examined into a number of cases upon which we do not deem it necessary to report. We have visited the county jail and find the same neat and well kept and the sanitary condition good. We have called upon the various County officers and find them diligent in their work and obliging in manner. We have thought it expedient to employ expert bookkeepers and accountants to make a thorough examination of the books of the various County officers, beginning with the last report of the same, and bring it up to the present time.

In view of the fact it will be several days before the experts can complete their labors and submit their report, and that our labors are finished we direct them to file their report in this Court when finished and report to the Judge thereof for their final discharge. And now having completed our labors, we most respectfully ask that we may be discharged.

Mary F. Morris vs Frank F. Morris; decree of divorce; plaintiff and defendant were married in Portland on June 26, 1892, and while they were residents of Seattle, defendant deserted plaintiff on Jan. 27, 1896. The plaintiff was restored to her maiden name, Mary F. Kinney.

James W. Smith vs Nancy M. Gribble, et al; it was ordered that B. C. Curry be appointed guardian ad litem for the minor defendants, Catherine E. Gribble and Martin H. J. Gribble, to represent their interests in the suit.

Mary L. Bradley vs Wm Anderson; defendant given 10 days additional to file answer.

James W. Smith vs William Jack, et al; absolute title to disputed premises given to plaintiff.

F. Rechner vs J. P. Watkins, et al; J. W. Loder appointed guardian ad litem for minor defendants, John and Floyd Watkins.

Henry Jewell vs Annie H. Whitlock, et al; Annie H. Whitlock appointed guardian ad litem for Edward Rutherford Whitlock, a minor.

Effie G. Nelson vs P. E. Nelson; plaintiff and defendant were married at Independence, Oregon, on the 17th of August 1896, and a decree of divorce was granted on the plea of cruel and inhuman treatment. The plaintiff was given the custody of the minor children, and the defendant was ordered to pay over the sum of \$100 for their support, and \$10 per month thereafter.

Martin Case Continued.

The case of the State of Oregon against E. E. Martin, the Populist ex-deputy County Clerk, who was indicted by the grand jury on three separate indictments for forging County Warrants was again continued for trial. District Attorney Cleeton had the case set down for trial at the November term of Court, but owing to the absence of two important witnesses, the case was continued to the April term of Court. Mr. Cleeton had the case set for trial, but the attorney for a continuance based upon an affidavit of Martin's physician in effect, that Martin was sick and it would not be safe for him to leave his bed. The case was continued until the November term of Court when it will be tried. There is no question of Martin's guilt and it is only a matter of time when he will be punished for the crime committed.

The case of Walter Weyland, another Populist, indicted for larceny from a store was called. Weyland did not appear and a bench warrant was issued for his arrest. He was arrested and asked permission to go out in the country and get some clothes. He never came back. He has skipped the country. One by one the Populist votes of Clackamas County are being reduced.
