Special Board of Trade Meeting.

The Oregon City Board of Trade held an important special meeting last week, President Cross in the chair. The object of the meeting was to discuss ways and means of assisting the commission appointed by Governor Lord, to arrange an exhibit for the Trans-Mississippi International Exposition to be held at Omaha from June 1st to November 1st during the present year. Addresses were made by W. C. Calder, of Portland, and Mr. Hurd, of Baker City, both members of the Oregon commission. Mr. Hurd explained how much more Seattle and Boise City were doing for their respective localities in the way of advertising than is Portland or Oregon, and also told how Oregon was losing her share of business and immigration by not having her resources properly presented. The general plan for aiding the Oregon commission in the matter of preparing an exhibit for the Omaha exposition was outlined and discussed. What the commission desires is that citizens throughout the state of Oregon shall loan small sums to the commission to defray the expenses of an exhibit, the same to be repaid when the legislature meets and makes an appropriation. There is on deposit in the state treasury \$19,000 of Oregon's proportion of the world's fair fund, that was never used, and it cannot be made available until the next meeting of the legislature. The remainder of the money needed for the Omaha exhibit not made up by private loans will be advanced by Portland capitalists. The following board of trade committee was appointed to solicit loans and arrange for an exhibit of Clackamas county products: E. E. Charman, C. O. T. Williams, John F. Clark, J. A. Thayer and F. T. Griffith.

HONEST POPULISTS.

The Middle of the Road Populists Hold a Convention and Nominate a Ticket

Pursuant to a call the Middle of the Road Populists of Clackamas county met at Pope's hall Wednesday morning for the purpose of nominating a ticket. There were 43 delegates present at the morning session.

Mr. Floyd Kirk called the meeting to order and announced the first thing as being the election of a temporary chairman.

Mr. Moran was elected temporary chairman and Frank King temporary secretary.

On motion a committee of five on platform and resolutions were appointed as follows: Kellogg, Candell, Sutter, Jones and LeCroy.

The following were appointed a committee on organization and order of business: King, Scott, McCord, Parish and Kirk.

On motion the convention took a recess until 1 o'clock in order to allow the committees to report.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The convention reassembled at 1:30 o'clock. The committee on order of business reported, recommending that the temporary officers be made permanent; report of the committee on platform and nomination of a full county ticket.

The committee on resolutions submitted the following report:

Mr. Chairman, we, your committee on resolutions beg leave to report the following:

Believing that fusion is ill-advised, is not honest, has ever been conceived in selfishness, has lived the life of a wanton and will die unhonored, is a sure means for our destruction as a political organization; we therefore place the seal of our condemnation upon it. We deem it (in this state) as the work of Butler, Towne Jones, through the agency of Pennoyer, and his co-conspirators and will have none of it. Therefore be it Resolved, by the Peoples party of Clackamas county in mass convention assembled.

First, That we renew our allegiance to the principles dear to the hearts of all true reformers, as set forth in the Omaha platform—Land, Finance and transportation. Also the initiative, referendum and imperative mandate.

Second, That we are willing to sacrifice men and offices, but principle never.

Third, We applaud the acts of the patriots who refused to be swallowed, bolted the state convention and gave to the true Populists of Oregon an opportunity to vote consistent with their political faith.

We condemn the policy of the present county court in its wanton waste of county funds, also the board of equalization for its cowardly submission to the corporations.

Until we can carry the principles of populism in with the officer, we care nothing for the office.

We are in favor of the strictest economy in the conduct of all the affairs of the county; and we believe that no county officer should be entitled to more remuneration than the same ability in any other capacity.

We regard it as the acceptance of a bribe, when any officer elected by the people accepts a free pass from any railroad or other transportation company.

We join with the millions of other loyal and patriotic Americans in their just indignation, since the present administration has utterly failed to bring forth its much heralded prosperity; it has opened neither mines, nor mills, it has shown its tender regard for Spanish bondholders and its indifferent attitude toward the starving Cubans.

While the woods are so full of scheming politicians, we believe in putting nothing but Populists on guard.

Resolved: That it is the sense of this convention that the endorsement of all true Populists who are now candidates before the people of Clackamas county is the wisest, most honorable course to pursue; and instead of widening the gap, it will have a tendency to reunite the Populist of the county and bring us into line for the campaign of 1900.

The question of coroner was left to the committee, the general sentiment being that the Republican candidate would be able to bury the fusion party.

After appointing a central committee, the convention adjourned.
