Hiram Allison, a pioneer, died at Hillsboro, Tuesday.

The farmer's congress at Astoria last week was a great success.

The right of way for the boat railway at the Dalles has been all obtained.

Capt. H. L. Hoyt, a pioneer of Portland, died at that place on Tuesday.

R. B. Hays, a pioneer of Lane county, died at Spencer Creek, on Saturday.

A new channel is being dredged at the mouth of the Willamette 40 feet deep.

Portland will export 25,000,000 bushels of wheat this year, half of the Pacific coast supply.

Rev. M. M. Gibson, of San Francisco, died Tuesday, at the home of his son in Albany, this state.

The Chas. Nelson arrived at Seattle from St. Michaels with about a million in dust on Monday.

Battery B is being rapidly filled by the recruiting officer. 29 men being mustered in at Salem Monday.

Geo. D. Gore, a veteran at the Soldiers' Home, at Roseburg, was married Sunday to Mrs. Henrietta Nichols, of Pacific Grove, Cal., and died the next day. He was a Vermont volunteer and she the sweetheart of his youth.

Mose Thompson shot George Ely in the abdomen at Pendleton last Friday, probably fatally, over a dispute growing out of a stage contract. Thompson claims \$100 in the settlement that Ely was not willing to allow. Ely is still alive although his intestines were perforated.

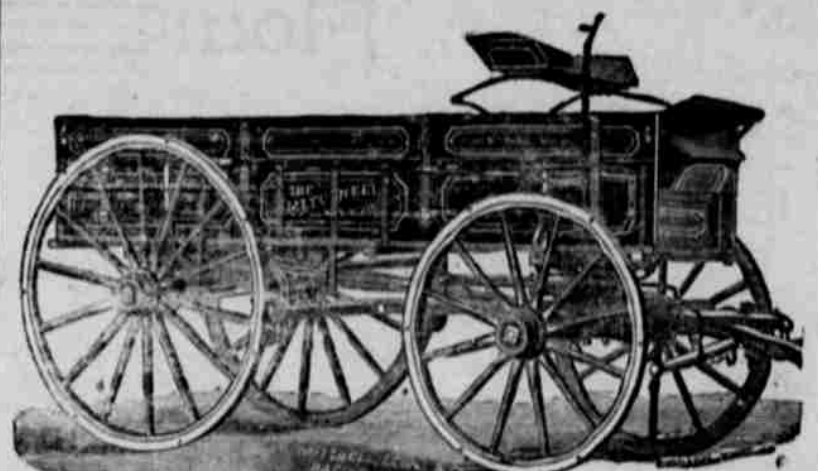
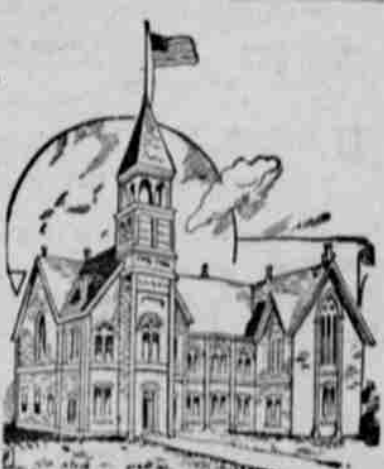
