## PRESIDENT'S PROCLAMA

WASHINGTON, August 12 .- The president issued the following proclamation: "By the President of the United States of America-A proclamation:

"Whereas, By a protocol concluded and signed August 12, 1898, by William R. Day, secretary of state of the United States, and his excellency Jules Cambon, ambassador extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary of France at Washington, respectively representing for this purpose the government of the United States and the government of Spain, the United States and Spain have formally agreed upon the terms on which the negotiations for the establishment of peace between the two countries shall be undertaken; and

"Whereas. It is in said protocol agreed that upon its concession and signature hostilities between the two countries shall be suspended; and notice to that effoct shall be given as soon as possible by each government to the commanders of the military and naval forces,

"Now, therefore, I, William McKinley, president of the United States, do, in accordance with stipulations of the protocol, declare and proclaim on the part of the United States a suspension of hostilities, and do hereby command that orders be at once given through the proper channels to the commanders of military and naval forces of the United States to abstain from all acts inconsistent with this proclamation.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States

"Done at the city of Washington, this the 22th day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and the independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-third. WILLIAM MCKINLEY, President.
