COUNTY COURT.

Proceedings of the Regular September Session.

ORDERS.

In the matter of the petition of F. L. Rugg, et al. for a county road, the viewers reported favorably, the petition was granted and viewers and surveyor's expenses ordered paid. In the matter of the petition of F. P. Larson, et al. for county road, J. H. Smith appointed surveyor, and C. A. Miller, Henry Gans and J. S. Risley, viewers.

In the matter of petition of School Dist. No. 28 against the remission of the taxes on the Clayton estate. It was ordered that attorneys for estate to appear at October term of court, and show why an order rescinding an order reducing the taxes of said estate should not be made.

In the matter of the petition of W. H. Burghardt, agent, for a motor franchise on the Molalla and Highland road, the same was granted.

"This matter coming on regularly to be heard, and it appearing to the court that said petition should be granted, and all things being by the court considered. It is ordered that there be and there is hereby granted unto W. H. Burghardt, agent, and his assigns, the right and privilege to lay down, maintain and operate iron and steel railway tracks, and to erect poles and appliances and stretch wires thereon for the purpose of transmitting power, to be used in operating said railway by electric power upon the roads of Clackamas county as follows:

"Beginning at the intersection of Seventh street, Oregon City, with Molalla avenue; thence along the west side of Molalla avenue to junction of Molalla and Highland roads; thence along the west side of said Highland road to a point 180 feet south of south pier of what is known as the Latourette bridge.

"The track of said railway shall be a single one with necessary turnouts and turntables and shall be laid and the poles erected for the purposes hereinbefore specified along the westerly side of said roads and within a line 16 feet from the westerly side of said roads according to the surveys thereof, which space is hereby granted to said W. H. Burghardt, agent, and to his assigns as a right of way for the purposes of said railway; said road to be placed upon adopted grades, excepting where specially agreed upon between this court and the said Burghardt, agent, or his assigns, from road abutting property.

"No right is granted to use any county bridge or culverts.

"The track over said right of way shall be completed within two years from the date of this order, and work shall be commenced upon the said right of way for the purpose of preparing it for the said tracks and poles within one year from the date hereof.

"The right is reserved by the county court to make necessary orders or rules to regulate the running of trains on and over the roads of Clackamas county that may be necessary for the convenience and safety of the public.

"All rights and privileges hereby conferred shall expire at the end of 50 years from the date of this order, or upon failure to comply with any of the provisions of this franchise.

"Said W. H. Burghardt, agent, or his assigns, shall within two years from the date of this order and thereafter during the term of this franchise, operate cars upon said railway at least once each day in each direction, over the entire right of way hereby granted, and a failure to operate said cars for more than 100 days in any one year shall work a forfeiture of this franchise.

"A failure on the part of said W. H. Burghardt, agent, or his assigns, to comply with any of the provisions of the franchise shall work a forfeiture of all rights and privileges hereby conferred."

Also, under the same conditions: "Beginning at a point on west side of Highland road, 1800 feet south of the south pier of what is known as Latourette bridge; thence along the west side of Highland road to where the north and south one-half section line of section 29, township 3 south, range 2 east, intersects said Highland road."

In the matter of plank on the Highland road, it was ordered that contract be fulfilled, and that payment for same come out of next years' apportionment of district No. 18.

In the matter of bids for county physician and burial of county paupers, the same was passed over.

The supervisor's bond of district No. 28 approved, and the supervisor was ordered to spend \$35, on the main thoroughfare where most needed.

In the matter of petition to refund \$2.91, paid to the sheriff by John Amster for taxes by mistake, the same was referred to sheriff.

The matter of examining the tax roll

and making tax levy for 1898, the same was continued until November.

In the matter of bridges in district No. 28, the same was referred to Commissioner Morton with power to act.

In the matter of painting the roof of the court house, the same was referred to judge with power to act.

In the matter of the care and keeping of D. Mortimer, it was ordered that Isaac Prindle be paid \$20 for keeping said Mortimer during the month of September. It was also ordered that E. O. Mortimer and Isaac Allison be cited to appear before the court and show cause why they should not support said D. Mortimer.

In the matter of raising the allowance of Mr and Mrs Ahle, it was ordered raised to \$20 per month, viz: September and November, warrant to be drawn in favor of Mrs. London.

In the matter of aid for Mr and Mrs Ramsden and Hank Matton, the same was referred to Judge Ryan with power to act.

In the matter of Mrs Runyan, a county charge, relief was ordered continued until further orders.

In the matter of delinquent tax sales for 1897, it was ordered that the county judge bid in all property not purchased by others.

In the matter of a road of public easement for Phoebe Sharp, viewers were appointed to meet on Sept 17, and view said road.

In the matter of the proposition of H. E. Noble to collect delinquent taxes, it was ordered that court inform Noble that the court had ordered county judge to bid in all property, not sold to others.

In the matter of repairing the Eagle Creek and Currinsville road, James Hayden was appointed to repair the same and receive \$3 per day for his services.

In the matter of the report of G. B. Dimick on taxes collected on the Clayton estate, the same was laid over until next term.

In the matter of reports of fees collected by clerk and recorder for the month of August, the same was approved as follows: Recorder, 126.15; clerk, \$152.05.

The report of the sheriff in the matter of collection of taxes for the year 1897, coming on to be heard, and it appearing that he had collected \$39,938.03, on account of said taxes, also claiming credits on account of errors and double assessments in the amount of \$319.29 and by amount returned on delinquent tax roll of \$19,406.75. It is hereby ordered that the sheriff be credited with the amount of \$39,938.03 and that said report be filed to come up for further examination and approved at November term of this court.

The mileage and per diem for the county commissioners for the September term, was as follows: S F Marks, 3 days and 20 miles, \$11.60; J R Morton, 4 days and 20 miles, \$14.

THE MOHAMMEDANS.

The Queer Manner in Which They Mix Up Religion and Murder.

The month of Ramadan, in which the first part of the Koran is said to have been revealed, is observed as a fast by all Mohammedans. The fast extends over the whole "month of raging heat" and involves extraordinary self denial and self control. No food or drink of any kind may be taken from daybreak until the appearance of the stars at nightfall.

The rigor with which a Mohammedan observes this fast and the great gulf between its observance and obedience to the moral code are both illustrated by a story told in the life of one of the heroes of India, Major John Nicholson.

While Nicholson in 1854 was deputy commissioner in Bannu, a native killed his brother and was arrested. He was brought before Nicholson on a very hot evening, looking parched and exhausted, for he had walked many miles, and it was the month of Ramadan.

"Why," exclaimed Nicholson, "is it possible that you have walked in fasting on a day like this?"

"Thank God," answered the Ban-

nuch, "I am a good faster."

"Why did you kill your brother?"

"I saw a fowl killed last night, and the sight of the blood put the devil in me."

"He had chopped up his brother, stood a long chase and been marched in here, but he was keeping the fast," wrote the commissioner to a friend, that he might know what sort of blood-thirsty and bigoted people he, Nicholson, had to govern.

One day a wretched little child was brought before the commissioner. He had been ordered by his relatives of the Waairi tribe to poison food.

"Don't you know it is wrong to kill people?" asked Nicholson.

"I know it is wrong to kill with a knife or a sword," answered the child. "Why?"

"Because the blood leaves marks," answered the trained poisoner.

A Pathan chief, who fell by Nicholson's side in a skirmish, left a little son, upon whom the English officer lavished care and attention. One day the 7-year-old boy asked his protector to grant him a special favor.

"Tell me first what you want."

"Only your permission, sahib, to go and kill my cousins, the children of your and my deadly enemy, my uncle, Faltri Khan."

"To kill your cousins?" exclaimed the Englishman, horrified at the answer.

"Yes, sahib, to kill all the boys while they are young. It is quite easy now."

"You little monster! Would you murder your own cousins?"

"Yes, sahib, for if I don't they will certainly murder me."

The little boy wished to follow Pathan usage and thought it very hard that his guardian should prevent his taking so simple a precaution.

Lying as a Disease.

"The liar is a much abused person," said a well known local physician to a reporter last week. "The liar is not always to blame, and if you have any friends who are addicted to false representation of things advise them to consult their doctors. There is hope for at least one class of liars. Medicine and medical methods are applicable to those who suddenly develop an abhorrence for the truth and lie on all occasions, even though the truth might better suit their purpose. This has come to be thought of only as a species of dementia that is oftentimes successfully treated."

"The malicious liar is a difficult problem, for he knows that he is telling a lie and there is no hope for him. But there are lots of people who just lie naturally, without knowing what they are saying or why they say it. The individual often has nothing whatever to accomplish by lying, but does so just as some people stutter. But, as I said before, he should not be blamed and frowned upon. His mind is unhealthy and his nervous system is out of order. Rest, tonic and good nursing often restore these people to their normal self, and then the love of rectitude returns, and they are effectually cured of a very embarrassing habit." - Washington Post.
