The peace commissioners received their instructions and left for Paris Saturday.

CUBANS DESTITUTE.

nately, it is the best element among the insurgents that are suffering most severely.

The Times, in an editorial article, draws attention to the difficulties facing the Washington government and the advisability that the peace conference be not unduly protracted.

The correspondent relates terrible stories of anarchy, and says the American government is apparently attempting to suppress the truth. As an instance, he gives the following story, which he declares was expressed by the general Key West:

A band of insurgents attacked recently the Freykenela sugar factory near Guines, one of the richest in Cuba. The guerrilla force, which the proprietor had maintained to defend his property until the arrival of the Spanish troops now do nothing to suppress lawlessness. The insurgents invaded the inclosure, where found a lot of reconcentrados. They stripped the women naked, and placing them in line, fired from behind them at the guerrillas, thus making it impossible for the defenders of the factory to return the fire.

The correspondent declares that the most irredeemable effect of the prolonged war in the island is the almost total destruction of the white population, which has left Cuba almost as black as Hayti.

NOT FOR INSURGENTS.

Troops and ships will be forward for other purposes.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—In connection with the sending of fresh troops to the Philippines, mention may be made of the fact that the battle-ship Iowa and Oregon are to go to Manila as quickly as possible, and mechanics are working night and day to get them ready for the long voyage. Vessels of this kind are needed to keep the Philippine insurgents in order, and their assembling at Manila, in conjunction with the dispatch of heavy reinforcements of troops for the American land forces, cannot but be regarded as significant.

In well-informed circles here it is seen that the real purpose of the president in making these preparations is to insure the peace commissioners against any interference in the work of disposing of the future of the Philippines according to their best judgment. Not having disclosed their plans in respect to the islands outside of Luzon, the seat of the capital group, the president reserves for the American peace commissioners the right to dispose of the remainder of the islands as they may deem best.

The long line of curious incidents to which one of the great European powers has been a party has beyond question done much to cause a feeling of uneasiness on the part of the administration tending to show a purpose to interfere in our free actions in the Philippines and these have only been slightly diminished by the apparently frank disclaimers of ulterior purpose, because the

incidents continue to multiply, and in a manner calculated to avoid attracting attention, such, for instance, as the gathering of naval vessels to the south of the Philippines, the only explanation of which is the purpose of acquiring either by seizure or by some secret compact with the Spanish government the important island of Palawan. It is gathered that it is the purpose of the president to prevent the alienation by Spain of any of the Philippine group, and these preparations, naval as well as military, are but steps toward the execution of his purpose. With the addition to the fleet of two battle ships, we will have a force second only to that of Great Britain in Eastern waters, while on shore Otis will have a more numerous army than any European power, save Russia.

THE ADVANCE GUARD.

One of the Oregon and Iowa's Escorts Already Under Way.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The advance guard of the naval expedition for Honolulu, and eventually for Manila, started yesterday, when the Albatross sailed from Fortress Monroe, via Brazil. The Albatross is a collier, one of four which are to keep the big battle-ships Oregon and Iowa supplied with coal on their long voyage around South America. The plan is to have two of the colliers precede the battle ships, and two to go along with them.

In addition to these escorting craft, Acting Secretary Allen today ordered that the Celtic and Iris be added to the expedition.

The Celtic is a refrigerator and supply ship, and the Iris is a distilling ship. Their capacity is enormous, and Mr. Allen said that no such perfectly equipped naval expedition ever sailed under any flag. With their large reserve supply of coal; with an abundance of refrigerated fresh meats and vegetables; with appliances and plant for making repairs to machinery, and finally with an abundance of fresh water, the squadron will be able to keep the seas for an indefinite period of time.
