THE LEGISLATURE

Little Change in the Senatorial Situation.

GOLD STANDARDS IN THE LEAD.

Many Bills Read but Little Interest on side of Senatorial Fight—Brownell's and Porter's Bills.

Senator Porter's bills to amend the code provides that in all cases where service of summons is made by publication, the defendant shall appear immediately on the completion of the notice or judgment may be taken. It also authorizes the county judge to grant an order for service of summons in the absence of the circuit judge.

Monday, Oct. 3.

The senate was called to order promptly at 2 p. m. The session lasted just 100 minutes, and in that time three new bills were introduced, one of them being read first, second and third time and passed.

During this session Senator Porter introduced his first bill No. 61. This bill relates to the publication of services of summons.

The house got to work about 2 o'clock and 12 new bills were added to the list swelling the number to 49, making the total for both houses 112. Six bills were read second time and referred to committees, when an adjournment was taken until Tuesday.

Tuesday.

The roll having been called in the senate, a motion prevailed to at once proceed to the election of United States senator. Eulogistic speeches were made by different members in presenting the following names: M. C. George, 6 votes; Corbett, 13; H. H. Hewitt, 1; Robert Akin, 1; George H. Williams, 1; A. S. Bennett, 6; W. W. Colton, 1.

Geo. C. Brownell in a very eloquent address, presented the name of Colton and voted for him. Porter voted for Corbett.

The house took a ballot during the morning session for senator which resulted in Corbett receiving 23, making a total of 36, lacking 10 of majority; M. C. George, 10, total 16; A. S. Bennett, 16, total 22; the balance of the vote was scattering.

Hon. C. B. Moores was noticed this morning watching the proceedings of the house and anxiously watching the vote for United States senator.

Judge Ryan is in the city looking after legislative matters.

The morning hour was taken up in the second reading of Bills and Referring, also the reports of bills from committees and ordering their engrossment or a suspension of rules and placing them on their final passage of which the following are the ones that ran the gauntlet successfully:

No. 16—Brownell's, Relating to the Settlement of Estates.
No. 65—By Michell, Regulating the Shipping of Sheep by Express.
No. 11—Driver, By Request, Divinity School at Eugene.
No. 7—By Selling, Fixing Salary of District Attorney of Multnomah Co., and Other Offices and Creating Salary Fund for Same.

A report from committee on Agriculture showing loss to the Agricultural buildings by a recent fire to be \$3765, on which there was insurance of \$1600 and asking an appropriation of \$25000 at the hands of the state to replace buildings and necessary machinery.

At 12 o'clock today the first joint ballot was had, resulting as follows: Corbett, 36; George, 15; Waldow, 22; Williams, 5; Eakin, 8. Balance scattering. Brownell voted for Eakin; Porter for Corbett; Kruse and Thompson for George; Knight for Waldow.

Wednesday.
Senator Brownell made a fine speech in support of the passage of the bill to repeal the railroad commission and was complimented by a number of the senators afterward.

Hon. A. S. Dresser is the very able and efficient chief clerk on the judiciary committee. This is but a just recognition of his ability as a well-read attorney-at-law, as fully one-third of the bills are referred to this committee.

Senators Brownell and Porter are not making many long, windy speeches but are watching legislation closely, both on the floor of the senate, and in committee work, both men are on hand at every roll call.

But very few bills have passed the house, a few of a local nature only, up to the present time, the trouble is there are in this body more new men and they take up more time in useless motions and an effort toward oratory, which only tends toward the delay of needed legislation.

Thursday.
The senate spent the morning session on second reading of bills and is getting the work well along, the house being a larger body, double the number in the senate, moves more slowly. They have about 65 bills before that body and while a goodly number have been read the second time and referred to proper committees they have passed at this time only a few bills and those of local nature.

The ballot for senator today is practically without change: Corbett, 36; George, 17; Eakin, 6; Williams 4; Smith of Clatsop, fusionist, 24.
