Proceedings of the Regular October Session.

Thos. F. Ryan, Judge; S. F. Marks, Richard Merton Commissioners.

Be it resolved that at a regular term of the county court for the county of Clackamas for the state of Oregon, begun in Oregon City, in said county and state Monday, the 3rd day of October, 1895, the same being the first Monday in said month and the time fixed by law for holding a regular term of said court. Present, Hon. Thomas F. Ryan, judge; Elmer Dixon, clerk; J. J. Cooke, sheriff.

Whereupon a term of said court is begun and held on Wednesday, the 5th day of October, 1895, the same being the first Monday in said month and the time fixed by law for the first day of said term of court for the transaction of county business: Present, Thomas F. Ryan, judge; S. F. Marks and J. R. Morton, commissioners; Elmer Dixon, clerk; and J. J. Cooke, sheriff.

In the matter of accepting the Deep Creek bridge, the same was accepted and bill of \$967, allowed, and bill of \$47 for extras laid over. In the matter of the petition of Frank Polifka, et al, for a county road; the said viewers not having been notified according to law, said viewers and J. H. Smith, surveyor, are hereby appointed to meet on— In the matter of county aid for Mr and Mrs Ramsden and Mrs M. J. Weston, the same was ordered discontinued from Oct. 1, 1895. The matter of a petition for a culvert in district No. 23, the same was referred to Commissioner Marks, with power to act. In the matter of the care and keeping of Mrs Green, the same was ordered discontinued after October 1. The petition of George Brown for a tax rebate, was disallowed. In the matter of the notice for the attorneys of the Clayton estate to appear and show cause why taxes should be rebated, the same was postponed until November term on the first day. In the matter of the request of Levi Erb, supervisor of district No. 35, for privilege to work Taylor road, the same was laid over. In the matter of the new road in district No. 2, the clerk was ordered to notify Supervisor Dimick to clear the right of way. In the matter of repairing Aurora bill; referred to Commissioner Marks and Supervisor Miller with power to act. In the matter of the care and keeping of August Sandstrom he was transferred from Mrs Winesett to Mrs Collins, who is to receive a compensation of \$20 per month. 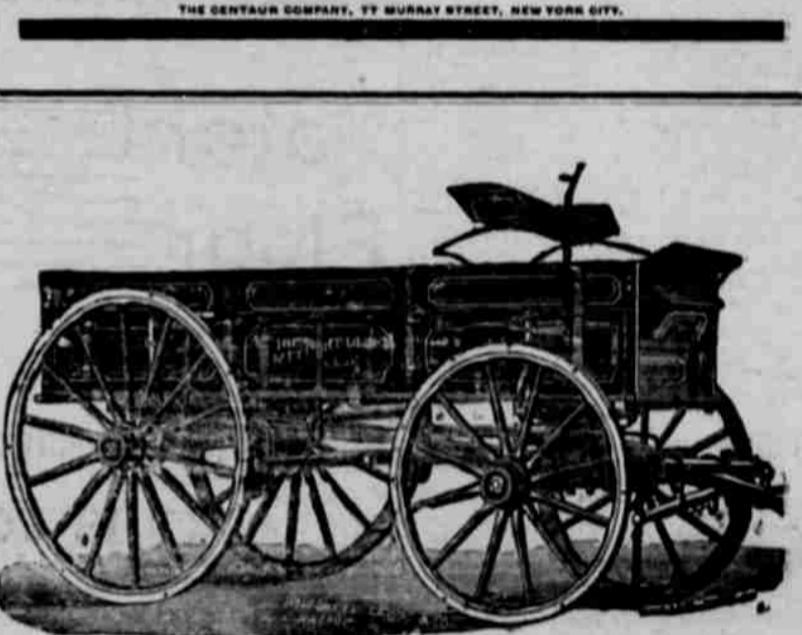
