A ROYAL WELCOME HOME.

Hundreds of Oregon City Citizens Met to Greet Huntley.

On Tuesday evening last at Weinhart's hall, the ladies of the Auxiliary Corps of Oregon City, tendered a reception to Lieutenant W. A. Huntley. The Oregon City Brass Band, and Separate Company F, together with several hundred friends and acquaintances greeted Mr. Huntley, all duly grateful for his safe return from the Philippine Islands.

Dr. Carl, point-devicce as master of ceremonies, introduced the Hon. Geo. C. Brownell, to deliver the address of welcome. Mr. Brownell, with his usual eloquence and patriotism, voiced the individual sentiments of welcome of those present, and gave due notice to our great country and our brave soldiers. Responding to the welcome, Mr. Huntley offered sincere appreciation, and with characteristic modesty ascribed all honor of the occasion to the noble cause in which he is enlisted. Earnest attention was given the words of Mr. Huntley and his assurances of the safety and healthful condition of those still remaining, and the occasional pleasant experiences amid the hardships endured were gratefully received.

Mayor Caulfield was present with words of commendation for our boys and country, stating:

"It has been the custom always, on the return of conquering heroes, to welcome them with great occasions of rejoicing, and festivals in their honor. If the opportunity had only been given Co. I, we would be celebrating, I am sure, the return of a conquering hero in the person of our friend, Lieutenant Huntley. That he is of the material of which brave soldiers are made, was demonstrated when he promptly stepped out in line when the call for volunteers from Co. F was made. No one knew better than he, that his action meant the severing of family ties for an indefinite period, perhaps for ever, risk of health, already impaired, and sacrifice of business interests.

"It is very proper that we meet here on this occasion to do him honor, and show our appreciation of the patriotism exhibited. It seems almost superfluous for me, as mayor to extend a welcome to Lieutenant Huntley on behalf of the people of Oregon City. The hosts of mothers, fathers, wives, brothers and sisters of members of Co. I, together with personal friends who have extended to him the hand of welcome is certainly evidence that we are all glad to see him back home again. However, in a formal way, I extend to him, on behalf of the people of Oregon City, a most cordial welcome. We are pleased to see him back with health restored.

"The news that he brings of the improved condition of the health, together with the prospect of the safe return of all of Co. I is indeed a source of satisfaction to our people who have had so much concern for their loved ones far away. It is the sincere wish of all, that the occasion may not arise that will require the return of Lieutenant Huntley to his post of duty, but rather that the balance of his company may soon join him here."

To H. L. Kelly is due the proudest number on the program. With facetious sobriety he related a number of humorous incidents and prompted a great deal of merriment concerning our Oregon volunteers. T. S. Sullivan, another speaker, noticed briefly the manly courage of our soldiers and observed that their accomplishments during the brief time engaged have never been excellent.

The various numbers of the program were interspersed with musical selections by Mrs. E. Sadie White, Mr. Chas. Miller, Mrs. Strickler's ladies' quartet consisting of Mrs. J. H. Strickler, Mrs. C. W. Gaunoz, Mrs. Chas. Caulfield, Mrs. C. G. Miller.

The hall was appropriately decorated for the occasion with the Stars and Stripes, and above the platform in massive letters of green, the greeting, "Welcome Home." One of the speakers mentioned that this reception was "only a foretaste of what the balance of the company would receive when they came marching home, for the demonstration would far surpass anything that Oregon City has ever known."

A season of general handshaking closed the reception of the first returned volunteer.
