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Unique Entertainment Furnished by a Builder of Big Engines.

Here is a picture of one of the most curious dinner parties ever given. It took place in an immense iron cylinder which will soon be used as part of the triple expansion steam pumping engine for the Chicago waterworks. It is not only a novel picture, but it conveys to the mind of the nonmechanical layman the immense size of some of the coal fed monsters which we Americans are so fond of harnessing nowadays to do our bidding.

The host was Superintendent P. H. Kane of Buffalo, builder of the engine. The guests who enjoyed the distinction

of supping in a cylinder were G. B. Bartlett, D. W. Lanagan of Chicago and Miss Florence Bartlett.

The pumping engine, it is stated, for which this immense cylinder is required has a capacity of 80,000,000 gallons every 24 hours. The stroke of the piston is 16, and the low pressure cylinder in which the dinner was given measures 84 inches in diameter, weighs 28,000 pounds, while the cylinder heads weigh 28,000 pounds each. The flywheels of the engine are 20 feet in diameter and weigh 44 tons.

Those who took part in this novel dinner pronounce the sensation of dining under such strange surroundings a very peculiar one.
