EDWARD N. A RUNAWAY.—While coming into the city Monday with a load of ash lumber from the mill, F. E. Linn's team became frightened on the Singer hill and dashed into a sewing machine agent just ahead, who was driving one horse to a covered rig. The agent was rolled out at a lively rate and his buggy pretty badly wrecked. The runaway team was stopped at Main street without having done damage to wagon or contents.

STORE BURGLARIZED.—Robinson's grocery on upper Seventh street was broken into Monday night by burglars, and about \$3 in change, some candy, cigars, etc., was the size of their haul. They made an unsuccessful attempt to open the safe. They then entered the butcher shop, next door, and added a few coils of sausage to their bill of fare. No clue has been obtained as to who the robbers are.

INTERESTING SOUVENIR.—Dr. Carl received Saturday an interesting souvenir of the great naval battle with Spain off Santiago. It is a metal paper weight fittingly carved, made from material of the destroyed warships, Vizcaya and Oquendo. First officer Charles Barclay, formerly of this city, secured the metal, had it cast, engraved, and sent from the United States navy-yard at Old Point Comfort, Va.

HOWARD'S HILL.—The Oregon City committee met the several committees from the country at Carus Tuesday and further discussed the Howard's hill question. A part of the committee of the whole strongly favor the establishment of a new route, beginning at Carus and bearing off to the right of the present laid-out road. It is maintained that a 4-per-cent grade to the top of the hill from Carus can be had over this route and a 5-per-cent from there to the bottom of the hill, while the best possible grade to be had over the present route, would be 6 and 8 per cent grades. The opponents to the new route claim that the expense of right-of-way and grading would be very heavy and are strenuous in their opposition. The Oregon City committee did not assume to dictate in any way, but offered to render any assistance in their power in coming to a wise and satisfactory understanding of the matter. A sub-committee consisting of J. R. Shaver, F. M. Manning, Frank Jagger and H. E. Cross, were selected to have surveys made and report at a later date to the whole committee.

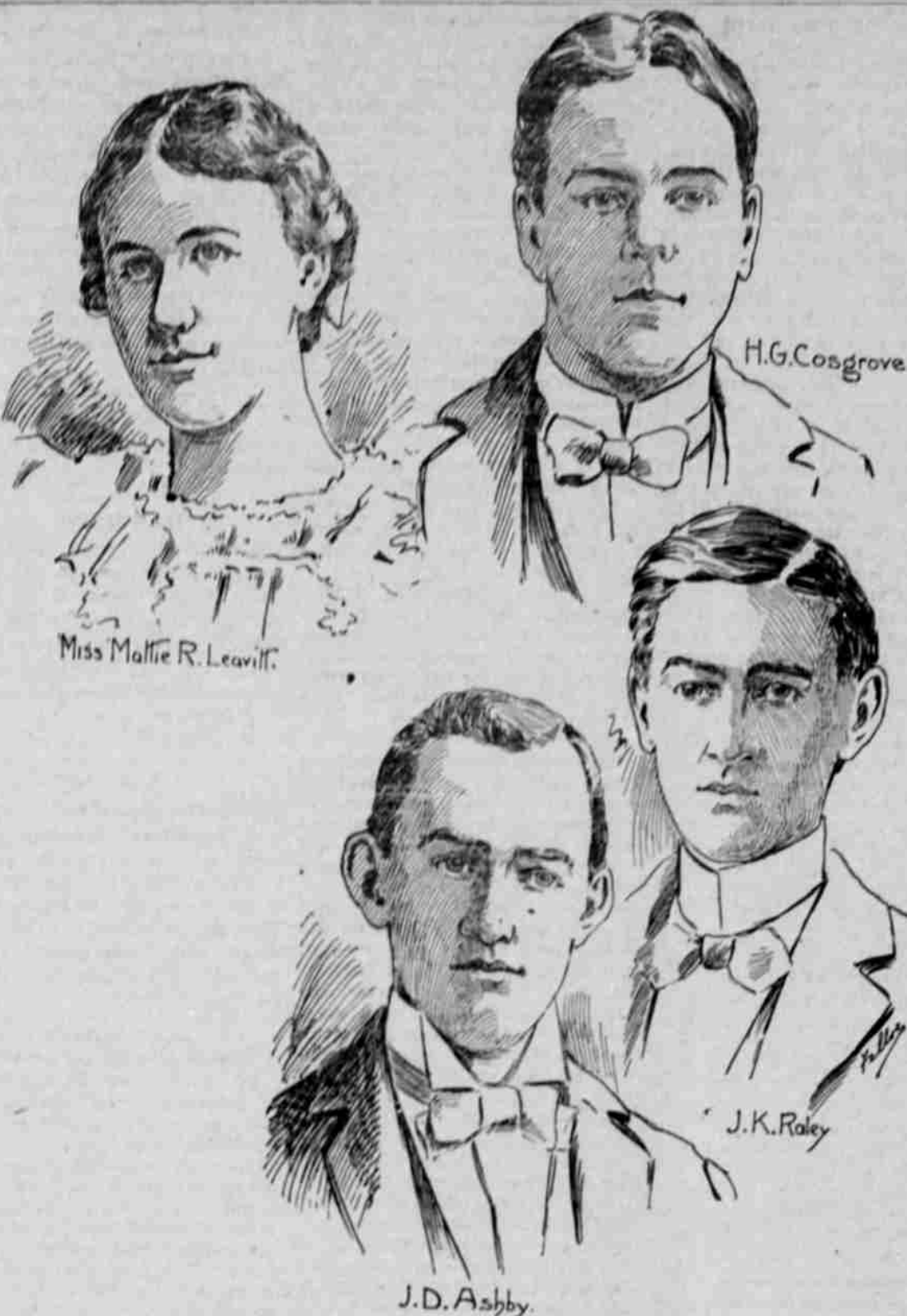
Senator Brownell's Bill.

One of the most important measures of interest to farmers passed the senate today; it is known as Senate Bill No. 4, and was introduced by Senator Brownell. This is in reference to the lending of state school money, of which I am authoritatively informed there is \$400,000 in the treasury, lying there without profit to the state. As first introduced, it authorized the state board to lend the money at a rate not less than six, nor more than eight per cent, thus leaving the rate discretionary with the board to that extent. It was advocated by a considerable number that the state should receive for its money the highest rate of interest obtainable, and this was claimed to be the business view of the case, but on the other hand it was claimed that this would tend to keep the money in the vaults, which would naturally give rise to suspicion as to its use. There were those present as usual, advocating a sliding scale, from six to eight per cent, but as Senator Brownell, a warm friend of the common people, with the able assistance of Senator Mulkey, of Polk county, made a hard fight for it, the measure was carried through the senate successfully, and has been transmitted to the house, for the consideration of that body. As the state always exacts real estate security, this will enable farmers whose farms are encumbered with mortgages at a high rate of interest, to redeem the same and procure a loan at a reduced rate of interest. The passage of this bill was in keeping with the message sent both houses by the governor, requesting such action, but Senator Brownell, seeing the great need of this measure, forestalled his excellency by introducing this bill the second day of the session. It is generally understood that the bill will meet with practically no opposition in the house.—Junction City Times.
