OREGON BOYS

Engaged in Fighting at Manila
Enemy's Loss Considerable.

Insurgents Driven Back in All Di- rection—Many Killed and Numer- ous Prisoners Taken.

MAMILA, March 13.—10:50 a. m.—General Wheaton's newly formed divisional brigade advanced at 7 o'clock this morning from San Pedro Macati for the purpose of corralling the enemy. It is now moving on Pasig, meeting with slight resistance as the rebels are in full retreat.

A gunboat is clearing the jungle along the river banks, which have been carried as far as Guadalupe.

The purpose of the move is to clear the country to Laguna de Bay.

STAYED IN THE TRENCHES.

Rebels Could Not Muster up Courage to Venture Into the Open.

MANILA, March 12.—The Filipinos apparently had planned an attack upon the lines of General Otis and General Hale this morning, but their courage seemed to flinch, though they fired signals and kept up the fusillade along the American front for an hour. Our troops, in obedience to orders, refrained from shooting, except with the exception of two companies of newly arrived men, who replied until they had suppressed the regiment of Filipinos. This body of rebels seemed under better leadership than most of the others. A white man was seen among the officers, endeavoring to lead them to the attack, but apparently all efforts to induce them to leave the trenches were futile.

The American authorities in Manila say the city is now so effectively policed that a serious outbreak is impossible. They believe that the natives are cow- ardly.

The presence of the families of officers is discouraged, and many are leaving on board the United States transports, some going to Japan for temporary residence. General Otis has remarked: "Manila is no place for women. This is war, not a picnic."

The British cruiser Narcissus has sailed for various ports in the island of Luzon, having on board British subjects who desire protection.

Oregonians Join Wheaton's Brigade.

This afternoon the Twentieth and Twenty-second infantry and seven companies of the Oregon volunteers marched to San Pedro Macati to join General Wheaton's new divisional brigade, which is to consist of the Twentieth and Twenty-second infantry, eight companies of the Washington volunteers, seven companies of the Oregon volunteers three troops of cavalry (mounted), and a bat- talion of light artillery. Although the rain which fell this morning has cooled the temperature to 82 degrees, many dropped from the ranks, overcome by the heat.

Several soldiers were sunstruck in the streets of Manila this morning. Most of them were not yet acclimated.

Brigadier-General Charles King has recovered from his indisposition, and resumed command at the San Pedro Macati bridge. The enemy are very active north of the river, though not doing any firing now.

WOMEN WANT TO FIGHT.

Anxious to Take Places in the Insur- gent Ranks.

TACOMA, Wash., March 12.—Oriental papers brought by the steamship Victoria contain the following extract from the Republica Filipiana, the insurgent paper:

"Splendid demonstration of the Cavite women, without distinction of class or age, unanimously requested with enthu- siasm to be permitted to take the place of men if the men perish in the struggle against the Americans for the defense of the independence of the Philippines. They say that irrespective of the weak- ness of their sex, the love of their country will make them strong and will animate them to keen combat against the Ameri- cans."

A telegram published in the Republica says that a letter has been found in Ballway offering \$50,000 reward for the assassination of Aguinaldo.

Stories of the battle contained in Oriental papers give details not covered by earlier advices.

General Otis' Advice.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The follow- ing dispatch from General Otis has been received:

"Manila, March 15.—Three thousand insurgents moved down last night to the towns of Pasig and Pateros, on the shore of Laguna de Bay, fronting Wheaton's troops on the Pasig river line. By heavy fighting Wheaton has dialoged and driven them back, taking 400 pris- oners and inflicting heavy losses in killed and wounded. He reports his losses only moderate. He now occupies

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS.

Regular March Meeting and Pre- vious Adjourned and Spe- cial Terms.

S. F. Marks, chairman; J. R. Morton, R. Scott, commissioners.

The court met Friday, February 17th 1899, pursuant to adjournment. The court and officers present of the 17th in- stant, except County Judge Ryan; and no business appearing, the court ad- journed to meet tomorrow, February the 18th, at 9:30 a. m.

The court met pursuant to adjourn- ment, the court and officers present as of yesterday, the 17th instant.

And on this day the following business was held, to-wit:

In the matter of the new commis- sioner and printing bill for Clackamas county, it is ordered by the court that Judge Ryan procure a certified copy of said bill from the secretary of state.

In the matter of the county and legal printing, it is ordered by the court that the county clerk advertise for bids for all county and legal printing, the court reserving the right to reject any or all bids, said bids to be opened on the first day of the March term of said court at 10 o'clock a. m.

In the matter of the mileage and per diem of the county commissioners for the adjourned February term, 1899, it is ordered by the court that the mileage and per diem of the county commis- sioners be allowed as for the adjourned term, February 17th and 18th. S. F. Marks, 2 days and 26 miles, \$8.00; J. R. Morton, 2 days and 20 miles, \$8.

In the matter of supplies and printing for county officers, it is ordered by the court that the county officers be author- ized to procure any printing or supplies they may need whenever they see fit.

The court now adjourned sine die.

MONDAY, FEB. 27th, 1899.

The new board of county commis- sioners convened according to law in special session this 27th day of February, 1899. Present, S. F. Marks, Richard Scott, J. R. Morton, commissioners; Elmer Dixon, clerk; J. J. Cooke, sheriff.

And now on this day the following business was had, to-wit:

In the matter of levying a bicycle tax—This matter coming on regularly to be heard under the new law and the court being fully advised, it is ordered that a tax of (\$1.25) one dollar twenty-five hundredths for each and every bicycle owned in the county be levied.

In the matter of the bill of J. E. Mc- Coy for repairing Clackamas bridge, the board of county commissioners having examined said repairs on said bridge and being fully satisfied, it is ordered that said J. E. McCoy's bill for (\$300) three hundred and sixty dollars (it being the contract price) be allowed, and the clerk is hereby authorized to issue a warrant in favor of J. E. McCoy for said amount.

In the matter of the bill of the secre- tary of state for a certified copy of the new commissioners law, the court being fully satisfied, it is ordered that said bill for (\$4 75) four and seventy-five hun- dredths dollars be paid out of the con- tingent fund.

The court now adjourned sine die.

Whereupon a term of said court is be- gun and held on Wednesday, the 8th day of March, 1899, the same being the first Wednesday in said month and the time fixed by law for the first day of said term of court for the transaction of county business. Present, S. F. Marks, J. R. Morton and R. Scott, commis- sioners; Elmer Dixon, clerk, and J. J. Cooke, sheriff.

The court convened according to law, and now on this day the following busi- ness was had, to-wit:

In the matter of the petition filed by J. L. Vosburg et al. for a change in the Abernethy road—in the matter of the petition filed by J. L. Vosburg and more than twelve householders of the county living in the vicinity of the proposed road described in the petition and praying viewers to be appointed to view and locate a county road in Clackamas county, Oregon, described as follows:

Commencing at a point 80 rods west from the northeast corner of section 32, township 5 south, range 1 east of the Willamette meridian; thence north one-half mile to the open line; thence east on open line to a distance of about 20 rods of the southeast corner of the north half of section 29; thence in a north- easterly direction to section line about 20 rods more or less from one-half mile stake between sections 28 and 29; thence north on section line nearly as practica- ble to the county road at the northeast corner of section 5, in township 5 south, 1 east of the Willamette meridian. Said petitioner filed his affidavit of notice posted respecting said road, showing that there had been posted one on the court house bulletin board and three on three of the most public places in the vicinity of the proposed road more than 30 days prior to the presentation of the same. He also filed a bond for \$100 ac- cording to law.

The court being fully advised, it is ordered that said petition be laid over to the April term.

In the matter of the petition of view- ers on the petition of John Ferguson et al. for a county road—in the matter of the report of W. H. Counsell, J. S. Risley and F. M. Sumner, viewers appointed at the last term of the county court to view and locate a county road situated in Clackamas county, Oregon, de- scribed in full on page 5 of this journal, said viewers filed their report showing that they had met on the 20th day of February, 1899, a day named in the notice served upon them, and were duly sworn by subscribing to a written oath of office administered by E. P. Rands, the county surveyor, after which they

proceeded to the designated place and did view and cause to be surveyed by said county surveyor the above de- scribed road. They also filed the field notes and plat of the survey. Said view- ers report favorably to the establish- ment of said road as viewed and sur- veyed, for the reasons that it is a good, practical route and of public utility. Said report was read on this day on its first reading and laid over for a second reading tomorrow.

When said petition was read the second time it appeared to the board that there is a claim or petition for damages filed (in case said report is accepted) by John Benson for \$1000. Therefore, it is ordered by the board that J. F. Apperson, Michael Outfield and John Tal- bart be appointed viewers of damages, to meet at the premises of John Benson on Thursday, March 23rd, 1899, at 10 o'clock a. m., and after being duly sworn that they view said road the whole distance through the lands of John Benson and determine, if any, how much less valuable his lands would be rendered by reason of the location and opening of said road, and report the same in writing at the next regular term of this board; and it is further ordered that the expenses of said view and sur- vey be paid as follows:

And it appearing to the board that there is no remonstrance or petition for damages filed, and being satisfied that said road will be a public utility, it is ordered and adjudged that the field notes and plat of said survey be recorded and in all respects approved and that said view and survey be established as a county road, and that the expenses of said view and survey be established by Clackamas county, and the clerk is hereby ordered to issue the necessary notice to the supervisors of the district or districts in which said road is located to open and work the same as the work of said petitioners will go.
