HE PLEADS NOT GUILTY.—Deputy Fish Commissioner, E. H. Balwin, of Clackamas county, was seen recently in regard to the shooting he is said to have done on the Clackamas the first of last week, and he denies the charge. He stated that he and another gentleman were in the vicinity of the shooting, the night it occurred, and, in fact heard the shots. His partner heard four shots but he only detected three. The commissioner stated that he was not going around shooting at people. That the law did not give him that privilege, he was thankful to say. He said that the shots had been fired by parties for the purpose of drawing his attention to a trick that they were trying to play on him. A cork line had been stretched across the stream to make it appear that a set net was out. He got wind of the game however, and the trick was a failure.

CLAIMS HE WAS DECEASED.—Recorder Tom Randall has commenced suit in the circuit court against Mrs. A. E. Martin, and her husband, G. E. Martin, to recover a piece of property that the defendant agreed to pay \$50 for, in consideration of the deed to same being executed and turned over to her. The land at issue is lot 13, in block 3, of Mount Pleasant addition. The complaint alleges substantially, as follows: "That the defendant, Mrs. A. E. Martin, and her husband, G. E. Martin, agreed to pay plaintiff, Tom Randall, the sum of \$50, just as soon as plaintiff executed and turned over to the defendant, the deed to the said lot; that the deed was given over as agreed, but refused to pay the \$50, and to further defraud the plaintiff, it is alleged that the deed was recorded; and subsequently the defendant mortgaged the land to a third person for the sum of \$200;" therefore, the plaintiff prays for a decree from the court, ordering defendant to deliver up said deed, and that the same be cancelled; and sufficient protection be afforded the mortgage.

WHO DID THE SHOOTING?—The first of the week while some fishermen were drifting in the Clackamas river, at a point near the railroad bridge, about 9 o'clock at night, some unknown person on shore fired several shots at them. It was so dark that it was impossible to tell who did the shooting. Strong suspicions are indulged by the fishermen that it was the new deputy fish commissioner, who discharged his revolver for the purpose of frightening the men away from fishing during the closed season, as well as in the Clackamas, which at any time, under the new law is prohibited. The union does not assume any responsibility of its members who run the risk of fishing before the season opens, however. At a special meeting it was agreed that anyone of their number arrested under these circumstances, would have to fight out his own case. The union will not appropriate any money for his protection in this course.

MEETS WITH OPPOSITION.—The question of the council putting in a sewer system back on the hill to tap the resident district, is meeting with more opposition from property holders than had been anticipated at first. At the council last week a remonstrance to the sewerage plan was submitted by property owners directly interested. It had 76 names attached, and recited particularly, that the expense of putting in the sewer at this time would fall too heavily upon the property holders. The council desiring to proceed slowly in the matter, has seen fit to give some one else encouragement to circulate a petition in favor of the plan, and hereby justify more fully the council's going ahead with the construction of the system, complete estimates in the meantime being made. The next regular meeting of the city fathers occurs April 5, but it seems the petition favoring the sewer is not going to have as many names as the remonstrance had. The council is justified if sanitary reasons make it imperative, in building the sewers anyway.

A Populist's View.

HARMONY, March 25.—[To the Editor] The Oregonian calls the last legislature a grafting institution. I believe it to be the greatest we ever had, as we never had so many grafts put in as at the last session, especially for the taxpayers of Clackamas county. As to grafting and how it should be done so that we may have something better than we had before is the question. If we have fruit that we cannot realize any benefit from we are going of graft it to something better and that is what I call reform. We cannot graft without hurting the old tree and sometimes it takes a long time before it heals, but the cut has to be made. I believe there was some good grafting done for Clackamas county, but my did it not hurt to have three commissioners for Clackamas county, road supervisors to be elected by the people, sheriff's salary cut \$300, recorder's \$300, clerk's \$300, board of prisoners to be let to lowest bidder, applicants to pay mileage to the county in the service of papers by the sheriff, the cost of a grand jury abolished, and the district attorney and school superintendent put on a salary. Now all printing is let to the lowest bidder. This looks like more than the taxpayers can stand, but be that as it may, the taxpayers of Clackamas can stand it. If we had more of it, so much the better. Let us have all we can get. We are not sorry for what we got. It does not matter to the taxpayers of this county what party it comes from, so long as we get it.

So long as a party cares for reform only for office and not for principle it looks dark for the people. Let this be our motto "a government for the people and by the people" and not a government by property qualification. If we look for reform we must reform first at home, in our country, and we, the citizens of Clackamas ought to be thankful for what we got. It is a step in the right direction and I hope that the men who will be elected to our next legislature will give us more of such grafting. Let the good work go on. We all have an interest in it and like to see it come. It is not the right way to look to self interest only.

A LAKE PILOT'S LEG.

How It Solved the Mystery of the Wreck of a Steam Propeller.

"We are never amazed when vessels go aground and are wrecked on Lake Erie during the gales that are common on that treacherous water, for we expect such things then," said a lake skipper, "but when one is grounded on a clear day and wrecked on a course as clear as the day in the hands of a pilot that knows the ground like a book we naturally wonder a little and want to know the why and wherefore. Such was the case of the propeller Susan E. Peck that went aground near Bar point and was lost with a \$20,000 cargo."

"The captain of the Susan E. had sailed successfully hundreds of times between Point Pelee and Bar point and in all kinds of weather, and this time he had a wheelman who was known from one end of the lake to the other as one of the most expert navigators in the lake business. He had been lying up a long time, for the very good reason that owing to an accident to one of his legs that leg had to be amputated to save his life. The lost member was replaced by an artificial leg, and then the pilot was ready to take his post at the wheel again. His first service after his misfortune was this trip of the Susan E. Peck, and he ran her aground."

"The puzzle to everybody was how it was possible for the propeller, handled by a man of such skill and experience, on a straight course only 40 miles long and with every sailing condition favorable, to leave her course. The pilot was the most puzzled and astounded person of all. He soon got another vessel, and this one he ran in such an erratic manner, but fortunately with no disastrous result, that he was compelled to give her up, and his usefulness as a pilot was gone. He and others went to investigating to see if they could discover what was wrong with his seamanship."

"After awhile they discovered what they believed was the trouble. In the pilot's artificial leg a great deal of steel had been used in the joints and other places. Sitting close to the binnacle, as he did while steering, this steel deranged the compass so that it threw the wheelman way off his reckoning and led to the wrong piloting that had wrecked the Susan E. Peck and endangered the other vessel that the wheelman navigated subsequently. This was what they argued, and to demonstrate the correctness of the theory the pilot took charge of a vessel without wearing his false leg. Everything worked to a charm. The mystery of the Susan E. Peck was solved, and the pilot was restored to his old place in the confidence of Lake Erie skippers and vessel owners."—New York Sun.

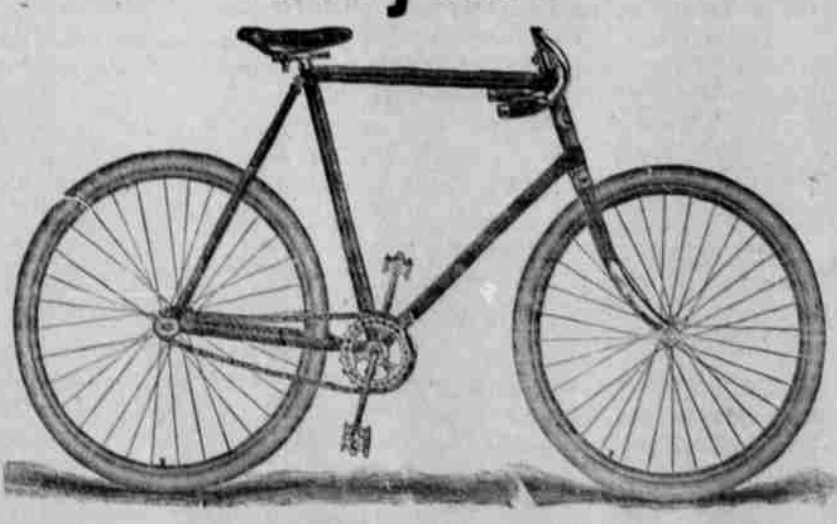

He turns her out of doors, and both are free to remarry. This is all. Girls are often betrothed irrevocably from infancy.
