C. A. work of this city will be interested to know something of the plan of the new Y. M. C. A. building now under erection. The building proper is 100x48 feet and will be made of wood built upon a splendid rock foundation. This foundation has for the month past been in the process of construction and is made of two heavy walls, one of which is 3x4 and the other 3x13 feet. Running parallel with the building and supporting it from the basement are three solid ledges of masonry which are warranted to support the heaviest kind of a brick structure and which will render the building perfectly safe and secure. Below the gymnasium proper are two stories devoted to the gentlemen's baths, the bowling alley and furnace. The baths are the most convenient and number seven. Adjoining these the bowling alleys will be built and these are to be fashioned after the most modern style and equipped with all the necessaries. The furnace will be erected upon a solid ledge of rock removed from the woodwork making damage by fire almost an impossibility. Next above these two lower apartments and comprising the gymnasium proper will be built three rooms devoted to recitation and reading purposes. At the rear of the room are to be built the ladies shower baths adjoining which will be a well equipped kitchen, leaving a space of 70x40 feet between the baths and recitation rooms, which will be used for athletic purposes. Above this is to be built the second story, which will be fitted up suitably for study and spectators who can occupy seats so arranged that they may view the proceedings below. This structure is to be finished in fifty days and when completed will be a credit to the building fraternity of this city as well as a valuable addition to the Y. M. C. A. movement.

SHOPPING IN ITALY. Outlandish Methods That Make It a Most Tiresome Task.

A source of trial is what appears to us the outlandish method of having things that apparently belong together sold in different establishments. Silks are found in one shop, wooleens in another and ribbons in a third. At none of these can one buy needles and thread. If a woman wishes to hang a pair of curtains, she purchases the materials at one shop, the rod and rings at a different place, the iron fasteners at a third and has to go to a fourth to find an upholsterer to put them up. She must visit a tobacco shop for salt and cannot find, as with us, vegetables, fruit or bread at a grocer's. It may thus readily be seen that one must travel a good deal to do her marketing or shopping.

Add to all this the confusion incident to the fact that the standards of measure and weight are different from ours, a meter exceeding a yard and a pound containing but 12 ounces, and a faint idea may be formed of the mental complications of the traveler.

There is also a certain amount of beating down to be done in nearly every shop, and even after an hour's bargaining the purchaser cherishes awful doubts lest she might not have bought the thing cheaper. Shopping is really almost equal to the contemplation of faded frescoes for lowering the mental tone, and it is hard to say which has the more to answer for in the exhausted state in which most travelers leave Italy.—Harper's Bazar.
