Notice of Street Improvement in Oregon City.

ORDINANCE NO.—

An ordinance providing for the time and manner of improving 4th, 5th, 6th, 8th, 9th and 10th streets from the easterly line of Main street to the stone wall known as the westerly line of the O. & C. R. R. right of way and of improving 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th streets from the westerly line of Main street to the easterly line of Water street.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

That Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth streets from the easterly line of Main street to the stone wall known as the westerly line of the right of way of the O. & C. R. R., and Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth streets, from the westerly line of Main street to the easterly line of Water street, be improved in accordance with the following specifications:

1. Specifications for the improvement of Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth streets, from the easterly line of Main street to the stone wall known as the westerly line of the right of way of the O. & C. R. R., and Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth streets, from the westerly line of Main street to the easterly line of Water street, with crushed rock.

2. The work to be done under these specifications consists of improving the aforesaid streets with crushed rock, laying curbs, corner blocks, sidewalks, together with necessary drains, grading, etc.

3. The grading will consist in grading said streets for their full width to the established grade of said streets and to such cross section as the kind of improvement may require, as shown on plan and cross section on file with the city surveyor.

4. On the sub grade between the curb lines will be spread three layers of crushed rock of the following dimensions and thickness. The bottom or first layer to be five inches in thickness after being thoroughly rolled, and to consist of crushed rock in pieces measuring not to exceed two and one-half inches, largest dimension. The middle or second layer to be four inches in thickness after rolling and to consist of crushed rock in pieces measuring not to exceed one and one-half inches, largest dimension. The top or third layer to be one inch in thickness after rolling, and to consist of clean sharp screenings, entirely free from dust or other impurities.

5. Each layer of crushed rock shall be well and thoroughly rolled with a road roller weighing not less than five tons, and the rolling shall be prosecuted until each layer and the finished surface are finished to the satisfaction of the committee on streets and public property and the city surveyor.

6. The crushed rock, when rolled, shall have a total thickness of ten inches.

7. The crushed rock portion of improvement shall be forty feet in width between curb lines, and shall be finished to such cross sections as shown on plan.

8. All crushed rock shall be thoroughly screened and free from all dust and other impurities.

9. Sidewalks must be laid truly to line and grade, and all space beneath them shall be filled and properly tamped with earth.

10. The sidewalks and curb must be laid and set before the crushed rock is placed on sub-grade. The curbs shall be set on a solid bearing throughout their entire length and filled in behind and thoroughly tamped. Three sills, 4x6, shall be placed underneath sidewalks parallel to curb line, and have a solid bearing throughout their length. The sidewalk plank shall be spiked with four-inch spikes to a bearing. All rubbish, which may accumulate during the performance of the work, or by reason of the work herein provided for, must be removed by the contractor at his own expense.

11. The sub-grade must be graded to such grade and cross-section as shown on plan in office of city surveyor. No plowing will be allowed within six inches of sub-grade.

12. Sidewalks must be constructed of two-inch plank, planed on one side, six feet in width, on each side of the street in accordance with plans on file in office of city surveyor.

13. There must be a line of wood curb, five inches wide and sixteen inches deep, placed on each side of the street, twenty feet from the center line of same, and laid to line and established grade of street.

14. Any work not coming under this contract, which may develop during the progress of the work and not described particularly herein, may, if deemed necessary, be done, by order of city council, for which the contractor will be held actual cost of material and ten per cent profit on labor account for such work performed.

15. The contractor, while improving said streets under these plans and specifications, shall, during the night, put up and maintain such barrier lights, as well as effectually prevent the happening of any accident in consequence of his work, and the contractor shall be liable for all damage sustained in any way by his act or neglect or of his agents, employees or workmen.

16. All settlements in any way made by the contractor, which may appear to be the final acceptance of the work, shall be repaired and made good at the expense of the contractor.

17. The work to be done under these specifications will be staked out by city surveyor, and the contractor is required to preserve all of said stakes.

18. The city surveyor is to make measurements and to decide as to amount or quantity of the several items of work. All work and all materials shall be satisfactory to him and subject to his rejection and his decision shall be final as to the meaning and intent of these specifications.

19. All lumber and timber used in the work must be sound, square and free from large, loose or snags knots.

20. All rubbish of whatever nature which may accumulate during the performance of the work, or by reason of the work herein provided for, must be removed by the contractor at his own expense.

All parties concerned are hereby notified that the above mentioned improvements are to be made at the expense of owners of property abutting said streets.
