

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS.

April Term of the County Board.

Marks, chairman, J. R. Morton, H. Scott, commissioners.

(Continued from last week.)

The matter of a request for powder for road district No. 24, it is ordered by the board that 500 pounds of powder be allowed for the use of said district.

The matter of a request for powder for road district No. 15, it is ordered by the board that 150 pounds be allowed for the use of said road district No. 15.

The matter of the petition of George J. Carr, et al, for a county road. In the matter of the petition filed by George J. Carr and more than 12 householders of the county living in the vicinity of the road described in the petition, and praying that the same be appointed to view and lay out a county road in Clackamas county, Oregon, described in full as follows to wit: A 40 foot road beginning at the northwest corner of section 34 township 30 south of range 4 east...

The matter of the petition and subscription list of road work from Road District No. 5. This matter being laid over from the March term of this board and coming on now regularly to be heard, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that said subscription list be accepted and county will allow \$200 additional to be used on said road.

In the matter of the claim of J. M. Ware for damages on account of an accident on the county road. Now comes J. M. Ware by his attorney, W. S. U'Ren and C. Schuebel, and files said claim before this board, and the board not being fully advised, it is ordered that said matter be laid over until the May term of the board.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of J. L. Vossberg, et al, for a county road. The report being laid over from the March term of this board and now coming on regularly to be heard the petitioners being represented by their attorney and the retractor and claimant for damages, by his attorney and the motion to dismiss and annul said petition on account of the deficient jurat of county surveyor to oath of viewers being overruled, and the motion of attorney for petitioners being allowed as follows to wit: It appearing to the board by satisfactory evidence that the county surveyor, E. P. Hands, duly and legally administered the oath in the above entitled matter, but that the said county surveyor failed to state in the report the title of his office and the capacity in which he administered said oaths, and that said error having been made, the record does not state the facts and makes the record in said matter incomplete and not according to the facts, and it is further satisfactorily appearing to the board that the said omission was merely a clerical error, and the board being fully advised in the premises, it is now therefore ordered that the said county surveyor, E. P. Hands, forthwith correct said clerical error and amend said record to agree with the facts by adding thereto the title of said office and the official capacity in which he administered said oaths to said viewers; also the following motion by retractor's attorney was duly allowed: Comes now the retractor in the above entitled matter by A. Berry and moves the board to dismiss the retractor herein; and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that said retractor be dismissed; and it is further ordered that A. Berry be allowed the sum of \$187.50 as damages for the opening and location of the Vossberg or change in the Abernethy road across said premises, said A. Berry agreeing to relinquish all his right, title and claim for damages herein for said sum of \$187.50.

It is further ordered and adjudged that the field notes and plat of said survey be recorded and in all respects approved, and that the said view and survey be established as a county road, and that the expense of said view and survey be paid by Clackamas county, and the clerk is hereby ordered to issue the necessary notice to the supervisor of the district or districts in which said road lies, to open said work said road by the petitioners and volunteer work. All that portion of the road heretofore described and asked to be vacated, be and the same is hereby in all respects ordered vacated on the opening of said road:

In the matter of repairing the Fields bridge, it was ordered that Mr. Ralston repair said bridge at once.

In the matter of advertising for bids for county physician. It is ordered by the board that the clerk advertise for sealed bids for a county physician, who will furnish all medicine, medical attendance, appliances, and perform all surgical operations for the county poor and inmates of the county jail from May 6, 1899, to July 2, 1900. Bids to be opened May 4, at 2 p. m. The board reserving the right to reject any or all bids.

In the matter of L. Matheson, an indigent person. It is ordered by the board that L. Matheson, an indigent person, be made an allowance of \$7 per month to date from April 1, and the clerk is hereby ordered to issue a warrant on the 1st day of May in favor of said L. Matheson for \$7 and on the first day of each month thereafter until further orders.

In the matter of road supervisors reporting the tools on hand with their monthly report. It is ordered by the board that each supervisor must report the tools of all kinds he has on hand with each monthly report of work done. Each supervisor failing to include said articles, the reports will be laid over until such omission is corrected.

In the matter of the illegal assessment of George Brown. Now comes George Brown before the board and represents to the board that he was wrongfully assessed in the sum of \$6.00 for the year, 1897; and the board being fully advised; it is ordered that George Brown be granted a rebate of taxes in the amount of \$6.00, and the clerk is hereby authorized to issue a warrant in favor of George Brown in the sum of \$6.00.

In the matter of the petition and subscription list from Cascades, George, Cherryville and Marmot precincts. This matter coming on to be heard it

having been laid over from the March term of this board, the petitioners being represented by J. H. Revenue, supervisor of road district No. 6, they asking the board for the appropriation of \$2,500 for plank and agreeing to do all the work and not ask the county for any further appropriations of road money, each district to share in the amount of road funds, and the board being fully advised; it is ordered that said petitioners be allowed the sum of \$1000 for plank on said road, which was started last year.

In the matter of increasing the allowance of Mrs. Sumner, a county charge. Now comes D. C. Latourette and petitions the board to increase the allowance of Mrs. Sumner from \$12 to \$20 per month, as she is sick and not able to work; and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that said increase be made to date from April 1st, 1899.

In the matter of the petition and subscription list from road district No. 1, it is ordered by the board that said petition and subscription list be accepted, and \$100 be allowed for the improvement of said road.

In the matter of Gus Perkle, a county charge. Said Gus Perkle having been ordered to come to Oregon City for treatment, and he having sent in word that he has no way of coming; it is ordered by the board that said Perkle get someone to bring him to Oregon City at the county's expense.

In the matter of drawing the county superintendent's warrant. At the request of County Superintendent Bowland it is ordered by the board that said superintendent's monthly warrant be drawn in the name of the deputy superintendent, Mrs. G. M. Strange.

In the matter of petition and subscription list from district No. 3, it is ordered by the board that \$150 be allowed toward planking said road, and that said subscription list be accepted.

In the matter of the deal made in school district No. 95, it is ordered by the board that said matter be referred to the school superintendent for explanation.

In the matter of the reports of the officers for the month of March, 1899. The board having examined the reports of collection of the clerk and recorder for the month of March, 1899, and being fully satisfied, it is ordered that the same be and are hereby approved. The reports show collections as follows to wit: clerk, \$295.00; recorder, \$182.55.

In the matter of the application of the county treasurer for an allowance of \$25 per month for deputy's salary. It is ordered by the board that the treasurer be allowed \$25 per month for deputy hire to date from April 1, 1899.

In the matter of an allowance for recorder's deputy. This matter being laid over from the March term of this board, and coming on now regularly to be heard and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that said application be granted as entered on page 40 of this journal except as to amount which is placed at \$45 per month.

In the matter of increasing the salary of the janitor of the court house. It is ordered by the board that the salary of the janitor be increased from \$40 to \$50 per month.

In the matter of mileage and per diem of the county commissioners for the April term. It is ordered by the board that the mileage and per diem be allowed as follows for the April term:

ADJOURNED TERM WEDNESDAY APRIL 12.
The board met pursuant to adjournment, the board and officers present as of Saturday, the 8th inst. And the proceedings of that day having been read and approved, now on this day the following business was transacted.

In the matter of the payment of E. W. Bingham's taxes in the town of Atkinson. It is hereby ordered that the whole of the taxes against the above named lot do Clackamas county, be settle for the sum of — and the clerk and sheriff are hereby ordered to accept the same and receipt in full therefor, when paid.

In the matter of the improvement of Molalla and Oregon City road from Carus to Howard's mill. Upon the petition of citizens of Beaver Creek, Mullino, Molalla and Oregon City, asking for an appropriation from the county road fund to complete that portion of the Molalla road lying between the southerly terminus of the plank road and Howard's mill. And the board being fully advised it is ordered and adjudged that the sum of \$2700 is hereby appropriated toward the completion of said road as indicated to be only used for that purpose provided the citizens of Oregon City, Beaver Creek, Mullino and Molalla, with the municipality of Oregon City raise an additional sum in work and material aggregating \$5,000. When said sum is secured by said parties, and that fact is secured to the board by the committees having that matter in charge, then the appropriation herein made shall be operative and the board will at once undertake under its own management to complete said portion of said road in way and manner and substantially upon the grades, lines and profiles made by J. Henry Smith, engineer.

In the matter of the petition to improve the road from west end of suspension bridge to Willamette Falls. Now comes G. E. Hayes before the board and represents to the board the petitioner of himself and 66 others praying for the opening of the balance of the road the west end of the suspension bridge and Willamette Falls. And the court not being fully satisfied, it is ordered that said petition be laid over.

In the matter of improving the Deardorff road in district No. 2. Now comes Mr. Deardorff and three others before the board and represent to the board that it is necessary that the Deardorff road should be repaired, and the board not being fully advised, it is ordered that the board will go and see the condition of said road.

The board now adjourned to meet at call of chairman.

A Famous Poison Mystery.

England had a famous poison mystery a quarter of a century ago. Two members of a great club in Manchester, both men of position and keen politicians, each received, apparently as a New Year's gift, small boxes containing a few cigars of the very highest quality apparently. Both were taken fearfully ill after smoking, and one of them subsequently died.

The cigars were found to be loaded with poison, and it was said that the man who recovered only did so because he used a cigar holder. The facts were at first hushed up, because, as was said, the suspected sender, whose motive was revenge on account of a lady, was a man of wealth and power.

But this subject was cleared, and the mystery was deepened by the following circumstances: A rich Manchester merchant, traveling one day in a railway car about the time of the incident related, got into conversation with a most agreeably and highly cultivated stranger, who finally offered his cigar case. The Manchester man was found at Leeds almost unconscious and the only occupant of the carriage. He grasped in one of his convulsed hands the cigar he had been smoking and after analysis showed it to be identical with the others. He recovered, but the stranger was never discovered.
