### HEARSE DRIVING.

#### Men Steadily Employed at It In the Larger Cities.

In smaller cities and in the country the hearse driver may between times drive other vehicles or engage in some other work, but in a city of great population like New York, where, in the natural course of things, many deaths occur daily and where many hearses. are used and kept constantly employed, hearse driving is a regular occupation. There are many hearse drivers in the city who have been thus steadily employed for many years. Only careful and skillful drivers are employed in this capacity.

The letting of hearses is a long established custom in this city. Many liverymen own from one to a dozen hearses and let them to sextons and undertakers. Perhaps half of the undertakers of the city do not keep hearses, but hire of the livery owners. So it commonly happens that in answering calls from one source and another the hearses owned by the liverymen are constantly employed. It might be that all the hearses owned in a stable, whatever their number, would be called for day after day and week after week, as regularly as so many carriages or other vehicles might be, and so it comes about that hearse driving is here a steady occupation, just like any other.

While hearses are commonly driven to and from the various cemeteries in and about the city, they are sometimes driven out of the city to various nearby cities and towns. 


