The populists over in Washington are getting on the right side of the expansion question and those of Yakima county have declared in favor of it.

THE COURIER-HERALD has changed from calling our soldier boys murderers to calling them heroes. It is easier to call them murderers when they are in Luzon than it is when they are in Oregon and they will be home in a few days.

THE Orange Free State is making war preparations and will probably help Kruger in case of war with England. There is a chance for quite a row in South Africa but if it comes it will be all British territory when the fight is over.

ALGER and Pingree have combined against McMillan in Michigan and the deal is to put Alger in the senate. There is nothing strange in the combination. Pingree is an astute demagogue and with Alger's money they hope to run the party in that state. It may be done for awhile but in the end they will fail.

REPRESENTATIVE PAYNE, of New York, who has recently been in Portland says that the East is in favor of the canal. If this is a fact it seems strange that the canal has not been built, or at least that work has not commenced. Whenever the railroad opposition to the canal is overcome it will be built and not until then.

THE decision of Judge Bellinger concerning the East Side Railroad amounts to putting the reorganization of the road into the hands of the Steels rather than Morris and Whitehead. The decision discloses that the bonds of the road were pledged rather than sold to Morris and Whitehead. We are glad Mr. Steel will have a chance to reorganize the road.

THE great harmony in the democratic party is illustrated in Kentucky. The state convention in that state has been in session a week without accomplishing anything at this writing more than to break up in disorder nearly every session. The sentiment is for Bryan, judged by the delegates.

Since writing the above they have nominated a ticket with Goebel for Governor.

NOTWITHSTANDING the prosperous times this country is entering on, Europe has returned \$375,000,000 of stocks to this country since January 1, 1898 because of the uncertainty on the currency question. In ordinary times this country could not have paid its debts at this rate but this vast sum has been taken up without being felt. Of course this only represents the foreign debts paid.

REED, while speaker of the house ruled it to suit himself and was termed the czar. As he is not to go back the leaders have got together and will put his power

in the hands of a committee to be known as the procedure committee. In the past the speaker has had too much power and was able to thwart any measure that did not suit him. Many a meritorious measure could not pass the house because the speaker was against it.

THE Klondike will send out many men this season who are now practically penniless in that region. The excitement over this region has subsided and hereafter the number of men going in will be governed by the demand for labor. Like all other mining regions it is the few that make the money but a larger strike is sufficient to send in thousands who are now trying to get out and have not the means.

REFORM PRINTING.

THE Courier-Herald was feeling very bad last week. The Enterprise exposed that paper's game in charging up \$3 per inch for sheriff sales when he had agreed to do it for \$2.25. The Courier-Herald is a reform paper and if he could preach how much he was saving the county and the poor people sold out at sheriff's sales and at the same time make the old charge, he would be the reformer that he believes in. As the county does not pay these bills he thought he would not be found out, but when the Enterprise exposed his game, he must turn around and abuse us. He makes no charge because he has not the manhood, but takes up the function of the late Press and tries to insinuate that certain things are true that he knows are false, and he knows better than to state that they are true.

If the statement of the Enterprise is doubted ask the board of county commissioners. This reformer not only made this over-charge but when called before the board, admitted that he had, but promised not to do it again. He had only been doing it for about four months. The board should have repudiated his contract right then and there.

This is not all the reform printing he is giving the county. He agreed to furnish blank books for 25 per cent less than the county had been paying. At the June term of the court he presented a bill for a book for something like \$17. On looking the matter up it was found that the old price was \$12 and with 25 per cent off would make the correct price \$9. This reformer only wanted about twice what he is entitled to. These are facts that can be ascertained—they are not vague insinuations. No wonder that he wants us to "shut up."

His statements concerning matters that the public is not interested in, is for the purpose of drawing attention from this printing question. They are too silly to pay any attention to, but if he feels better, keep it up. He can have a chair in our office and make faces for a day if he wishes to.

Still he is a reformer and is doing business to save money for the county.

At the recent reunion of the Rough Riders, Gov. Roosevelt used the following language concerning the Philippine question.

"So much for our comrades of the regiment. Let us not forget our comrades who this summer are facing all that we faced last summer. Let us not forget the gallant men, the regulars and volunteers who are upholding the honor of the flag and the interests of the nation in the Philippines. Surely there is not one of us whose veins have not tingled with pride as he read of the gallantry of those men; and I suppose few of us have not thought at times that we should like ourselves to fight beside Lawton, as we fought beside him last July, and see if the rough riders could not do their share of the work now done by the splendid men who followed Funston, Hale and other daring leaders, who, during the past six months, have added so many new pages to the honor-roll of American history."

"To our shame be it said there are men in this nation so indifferent to the country's honor, so lukewarm in patriotism and courage, that they would let all the work of these men go to naught—let their blood be spilled in vain. But the heart of our nation is sound, and the puny folk who deem it otherwise are woefully mistaken in their countrymen. Where our flag has been raised it shall not be hauled down. If any difficulty seems greater than we expected, it merely means that we shall exert a little more strength in overcoming it."

"I read with pride the other day how both senators from California, those of opposite political parties, joined in assuring the president that California would stand like a rock behind him in seeing that there was no step back in the Philippines. And so I can assure him of the like spirit from the great state of which I have the honor to be governor. We stand ready to give him whatever he needs in men or money to put down the armed savagery to which we are opposed in the Philippines. He shall have all he wishes to put it down quickly; and, whether it is put down quickly or not, he shall have our support in ever-increasing measure until the last spark of resistance has been stamped out. We want no peace talk with men who bear arms in their hands.

When once they submit, they shall be treated with absolute justice and equity and their rights most carefully guarded; but until they submit they must be taught with rough hands what it is to make war upon the American flag. There is no East, and no West, when we come to deal with questions of this kind. The United States is to be the great power of the Pacific, and we men of the Atlantic coast are good Westerners, and are as resolutely bent upon upbuilding our power in the Pacific as the men on the Pacific slope themselves.

THIS shows the sentiments and idea of one of the coming men and the man or party that tries to ignore the plain duty of the government in this matter and thereby gain political capital or prestige will find that he has not judged the temper of the American people aright.

The Madrid Museum.

After the social side of life in the Spanish capital has lost some of its novelty there are always the collections to see and admire. And, after all, the crowning glory of the place is the Museo del Prado, which, if not the finest in Europe, at least ranks with the Louvre and the galleries of Dresden and Florence, says a correspondent in the Chicago Record. The gallery is especially rich in portraits of the great kings of Spain, and its chief treasures are the works of Diego Velasquez, some 60 in number. The light of the gallery itself is perhaps poor, but the charm of being able to walk undisturbed and never crowded amid this marvelous collection of works by the masters is enough of itself to repay a visit to Spain. The royal collection of armor at the palace is as interesting as the Prado pictures in a way, and after these collections come others less notable, but worthy of a visit.
