The secretary of the Interior has approved a patent of 11,685 acres in the Oregon City land district to the Oregon California Railroad Company. Owing to the Madison street bridge in Portland being closed for repairs, passengers by the electric line are compelled to walk across the bridge. Oregon City did not celebrate the Fourth, but wait until the "soldier boys" come home and the old town will see such a celebration that will jar the bones off the rocks. Rev. S. Copley, of Michigan, the new pastor of the Evangelical church has arrived with his family and settled in the home on Madison street between Seventh and Eighth.
