Ordinance No.

An ordinance authorizing G. C. Fields, his heirs or assigns, to construct, maintain and operate a railway on Main Street in Oregon City, from the intersection of Main and Third Streets, to the southern limits of the city.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Sec. 1. That there be and hereby is granted

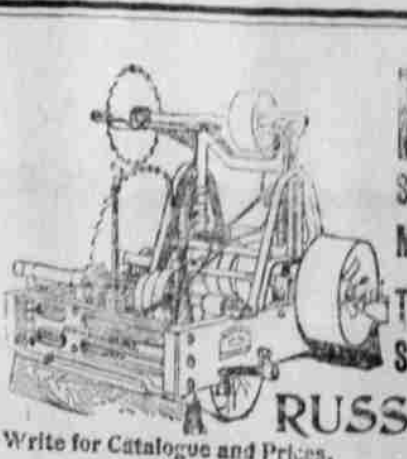

ed into G. C. Fields of Clackamas, Oregon, heirs or assigns, the right and privilege of laying down, maintaining and operating a street railway tracks, and to erect poles, appliances and stretch such wires thereon as may be necessary, for the purpose of transmitting power and current electricity, and to operate a railway within the city of Oregon City as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the Main and Third streets, thence southerly and westwardly to the intersection of Main and upon Main street, and over and under the road on the easterly side of the Main street, to the intersection of Main and the southern boundary of said city.

Sec. 2. At least one track of said railway shall be completed and in operation within eighteen months after the date of the taking of this franchise; and in the event the whole line of distance herein provided is not built and in operation at the time, the rights herein granted shall be null and void, and the franchise shall be declared forfeited and of no effect.

Sec. 3. The track of said railway shall be a single or double line of tracks with necessary turnouts, trestles and viaducts, and shall be laid as nearly as practicable to the center of the street, and if found necessary, the grade of said street, when improved, shall be altered in such a manner as to offer as little obstruction as possible to the passage of vehicles.

Sec. 4. The cars to be used upon said railway shall be operated by electric cable or horse-power; and the cars shall be operated by the city of Oregon City at any time by resolution, grant power to use compressed air or other power deemed advisable.

Sec. 5. The owner or owners of said railway, street grade, track, viaduct, trestle, or any other structure, shall keep in repair the entire structure occupied by the track or tracks, and shall maintain all the street above the line of said track, and all railings between the basin and the highway for the protection of the public.

Sec. 6. The rate of fare shall not exceed five cents for each passenger traveling in any one direction, on the lines of said railway within the city limits.

Sec. 7. Said railway shall be used for the transportation of passengers for the general convenience of the public, and continuously and the cars shall run as frequently as every thirty minutes, from 6 o'clock a. m. until 7 o'clock p. m., thereafter at least once an hour until 9 o'clock p. m., excepting delays caused by unavoidable accidents, casualties or other causes.

Sec. 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to obstruct the railway or to hinder, obstruct or operate of the same, or person or persons who shall carelessly or negligently violate the provisions hereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction before the City Judge shall be punished by a fine not less than five dollars and not more than twenty dollars, or imprisonment in the city not exceeding ten days or both, at the discretion of the court, for each and every offense.

Sec. 9. Any conductor or other employee of the railway herein provided for, passenger thereon, or other person about the cars belonging thereto, who by offensive, indecent or abusive language, insult, abuse or maltreat any passenger or persons, shall, on conviction before the City Recorder or city court, be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars, or imprisonment in the city not exceeding ten days, or both, at the discretion of the court, for each and every offense.

Sec. 10. All rights and privileges conferred, shall expire at the end of five years from the date of the approval of this ordinance.

Sec. 11. The said G. C. Fields, his heirs or assigns, shall be deemed to have accepted all rights and privileges conferred by this ordinance, unless he or she within thirty days after the approval of this ordinance by the Mayor, file in the City Recorder of Oregon City, their written acceptance of the rights and privileges hereby conferred, subject to the terms, restrictions and conditions of this ordinance contained.

Read first time and ordered published a special meeting of the city council July 12, 1899.
