Elk—Close season lasts until the first... day of December, 1910. Grouse—Prairie chicken, pheasant, quail... or partridge, close season from... December 1 to October 1 following in... Western Oregon; November 1 to August 1... in Eastern Oregon.

Pheasant and Mongolian pheasant—... Same as grouse. Partridge—Same as grouse.

Swan—Same as ducks. Wild turkey or English partridge—... Close season from January 31, 1896 to... February 1, 1904.

A SHOOTING STAR.
