Benefits the Road Fund.

Under the federal law five per cent of the amount received from the sale of government lands is apportioned among the various counties in the state for road purposes. Sometime ago Gov. Geer received \$1,475.84 from that source and on Friday the work of apportioning it among the several counties was completed. In the distribution Clackamas county receives as its share the magnificent sum of \$26.81 the distribution being based upon the percentage of government land in each county.

About That Withdrawal.
