AUGUST 16 IS THE DATE Decided Upon for the Reception and Picnic to be Tendered Company I. Pursuant to call the General Reception Committee having in charge the arrangements for the reception to be tendered to the members of Company I, on their arrival home from the Manila campaign, met in the armory on Tuesday evening to take definite action upon the matter. Owing to the difficulties arising from the unexpected detention of the regiment in San Francisco, the committee had abandoned work upon the affair and this meeting was for the purpose of deciding definitely just what would be done. The question was thoroughly discussed from every point and it finally voted to hold the reception on Wednesday, August 16th. Everything now points to the boys arriving home about August 10th and it may be that they will come straggling back in small parties and for that reason the date was set for the 16th thus allowing ample time for all to get back and also give them an opportunity to meet and visit with their families before they are called upon to figure in a public reception. The fact of their being already at home will do away with the proposed transporting them by boat, and the arch of welcome will also be dispensed with. Outside of these two features the program will follow the lines as originally planned. There will be a parade to Broderick's Park where there will be a short program of music and speaking followed by the banquet to the boys. In order to avoid any misunderstanding it should be remembered that the banquet is intended for the soldier boys and the public are expected to bring their lunch baskets and enjoy a picnic dinner. The date being now definitely settled the members of the committees are urged to immediately complete all their preliminary work and make the occasion a memorable one. There will be no attempt at spread eaglesism, just a plain hearty welcome to the home boys and members of Company I, who saw their duty and did it in a brave soldierly manner that reflected credit and honor upon them and their state.
