Circuit Court Matters.

A complaint was filed August 2nd on behalf of Bertha Brown against Robert Brown asking for a dissolution of the marriage bonds between the two on the grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. The case was filed August 4th.

Y. M. C. A. NOTES.

The gymnasium is being fitted up with new apparatus and classes will be organized for physical training. Already there is a class for business men from 4 to 6 o'clock daily which is meeting with success.

The ladies have fitted up the parlor with several handsome paintings and with the addition of a carpet, window shades and a few more pieces of suitable furniture, the room will be comfortable and attractive.

The public is cordially invited to use the public reading room at all hours. The leading periodicals and magazines and weekly and daily papers are kept constantly on hand for such use.

From 50 to 75 baths are taken weekly at the rooms. This number should be increased several times and accommodations are amply provided for doing so. Hot and cold water in shower or tub at all hours each day from 9 a. m. till 10 p. m. Baths free to members, to those not members 25 cents.

The Sunday 4 p. m. meeting for men has thus far been well attended and efforts are being made to make this service especially interesting and attractive. A first class pianist has been secured and this service is begun with a ten or fifteen minute spirited song service, often interspersed with special singing or a solo, duet or quartet. These Sunday afternoon meetings are always open to the public and to men and boys especially.
