THE TEACHERS' FRIEND. Mrs. Emmons Blaine Will Endow a School of Pedagogy.

Mrs. Emmons Blaine, who gave \$25,000 a year ago to the Teachers' College of the University of Chicago, is going to show her interest in the cause of education by endowing a school of pedagogy in the same city.

Mrs. Blaine has had this idea in mind since 1865. The daughter of the late Cyrus H. McCormick, the great mower and reaper man, she inherited a fortune of millions.

Colonel Francis W. Parker, the present head of the Cook County Normal school, has been selected to organize the college and will be given wide powers in establishing an institution under the broad ideas that have been developed during his long career as a teacher of teachers.
