IT IS A SUCCESS.—The 8 o'clock closing move is fully expressed in the above head. Promptly at 8 o'clock Monday evening the doors of the business houses, drug stores and cigar stores excepted, were closed and the clerks relieved from duty. The experience was much appreciated by the patient clerks and as time goes by it is seen that the business interest suffer no loss by shortening the hours. One or two houses have not signed the agreement but their stores close as promptly as any of them. A move is now under way to effect a combination by which the drug stores will close at 9 o'clock with the privilege of opening in serious cases for the compounding of prescriptions.

WANTY COMPLETED.—The bicycle path commission have reached the end of their purse strings and there remains a mile and a quarter of path before the Multnomah county line is reached. By using the county road from Milwaukie a connection can be made, but the bicyclists of that town are anxious to have the path completed and Emil Bottemiller, Will Havidon, and Mr. Jackson offer to complete the work and wait until the 1900 bicycle tax is collected for their pay, if they can be secured in some way. The Milwaukie wheelmen are much interested in having the path completed and some of their fertile brains will yet evolve a plan by which the financial difficulty may be satisfactorily overcome.

THE CLERKS ORGANIZER.—Last Friday evening in response to a call of the committee the clerks of Oregon City met in the council chamber to discuss the question of forming a Clerk's Association. The meeting was called to order by C. B. Clement, who was elected temporary chairman and C. M. Mason was elected secretary. The object of the association is to bring the clerks together so as to work with greater unity for all things affecting the welfare of the fraternity. Several of the merchants were present and made remarks in which they expressed their endorsement of the association, believing that such an organization will tend to advance the interests of the employer. With the enthusiasm manifested by the clerks and the hearty co-operation of the employers there can be no obstacle to a strong organization in this city. After a short discussion the meeting adjourned until Tuesday evening. At the second meeting nearly every clerk in town was present and it was decided to push the matter of organization along as rapidly as possible. A committee consisting of Messrs. G. T. Howard, C. M. Mason and C. B. Clement was appointed to prepare a constitution and by-laws. Messrs. Mason, Allen and Hill were appointed as a ways and means committee, and P. Troglia was elected treasurer. The secretary was instructed to tender to Mayor Latourette the thanks of the association for his kindness in allowing the use of the council chamber for their meetings. Another meeting is called for next Tuesday evening when the committee on by-laws expect to present their report and the permanent organization can be completed. Among other matters that are expected to come up for discussion is the question of inviting the ladies to join the association. The next meeting is to be held in the parlors of the Electric hotel.

Yachting on Salt. Save during the rainy season Lake Lefroy, in western Australia, is quite dry. All boats which sail on the lake when possible are, during the rainy season, fitted with four wheels, and thus are enabled to continue their travels. A PAIR OF BIG FEET.

They Brought War to France and Changed the Map of Europe. The Princess Bismarck changed the political history of France unwittingly, and but for her the Franco-Prussian war might never have been waged.

THE MYSTERY OF DREAMS.

A Case in Which the Coincidences Were Remarkable.

On an occasion during the civil war I dreamed that I was standing beside a road when there came marching along it a strong column of prisoners, with guards at intervals on the flanks. I asked one of these guards who the prisoners were and where they had been captured. He informed me that they had been taken in an engagement with the enemy on the day before and that there were 1,900 of them. I then asked some bystander what day of the month it was and was told that it was such a day of a certain month, some six weeks later than the date of the dream. The whole dream was extremely distinct, and it made a strong impression on me. I related it to a number of my comrades within the next few days and then thought of it no more.

Six weeks later, on the morning of the very day that had been mentioned in the dream as the date when the column of prisoners had passed before me, I was on picket two miles distant from the point where I had seemed to be when I saw them. It was soon after breakfast, and I was standing by the side of the road at the fire talking to the officer of the picket when an aid to the commanding general came riding down the road. He had been a schoolfellow of our officer's at West Point and reined up when he recognized his friend. He told us that he had good news, that there had been a sharp engagement with the enemy the day before and that our people had captured 1,900 prisoners, who had just passed the headquarters that morning on their way to the rear.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
