THE LOCAL NEWS.

How is Good Shape.—Hop buyers report that samples are coming out of the hop in much better condition than had been expected.

Welch is Discharged.—Dentist J. E. Welch who was arrested at Silverton last week for shooting Smith in the eye and had his preliminary hearing last night and was promptly discharged.

The Month's Business.—The summary of the county business for September shows that the county clerk collected \$26.25 in fees and the recorder's office collected \$120.15. Warrants were issued to the general fund to the amount of \$47.40.

"Jolly Fellows" Party.—The Jolly Fellows will open the social season with the first of a series of seven dancing parties on October 27th. The club has secured the services of Everett's orchestra for their parties and it is their intention to out-do their success of last season.

Pedestrians Improved.—Some bad breaks in the sidewalk on the west side of Main street south of Twelfth have been repaired, so that pedestrians can again safely pass at night. There are a few other bad places in other parts of town that require fixing before somebody is injured and damage suits instituted.

Was Buried Here.—The remains of Charles Williams, the young man who was accidentally killed at New Era last week, were buried in Mountain View cemetery here, last Saturday. Rev. Klingler conducted the services which were attended by a number of the young man's friends.

Taken to Salem.—William Beck, a seven year old boy whose home is at the post office was before Judge Ryan yesterday for examination as to his sanity. Sufficient cause was found to commit him to the insane asylum and Sheriff Cooke took him to that institution Wednesday evening.

Change in Bakery.—Peter Roos, who for some time past has conducted the bakery on upper Seventh street, has sold out the business to Joseph Kuersten, who assumed charge of it Monday. Mr. Kuersten is an old and respected citizen of Oregon City and his many friends wish him success in his new undertaking.

High Time at Canby.—The Workmen of Canby hold open house tonight and extend a cordial invitation to every member of the A. O. U. W. and their families to be present. The Canby members are royal entertainers and promise that this occasion will be a record-breaker. The exercises consist of an open meeting at which the most noted speakers in the county will be heard. A musical and literary program, to be followed by a big supper and the whole to conclude with a big dance.

Church Meeting.—The annual congregational meeting of the Presbyterian church was held Monday evening. J. C. Zinner and A. Robertson were re-elected

elders for a term of three years. Claude Adams and M. M. McJannet were elected deacons for three years; C. Scheibel, treasurer; and John R. Williams, superintendent of Sunday school. Miss Minnie Meyer was elected secretary and treasurer of the Sunday school and Miss Mamie Adams librarian. The choir was continued without change. Reports were presented from the different societies and auxiliaries and all are in a flourishing condition with a financial balance on the right side. During the past year the Sunday school shows a gain of 50 per cent, and the Endeavor society presents a gain of 97 per cent, all of which is most gratifying.

MILITIA MATTERS.—Capt. Metzner, of Co. F, was quite disappointed Wednesday on the receipt of word from Inspector General Jackson that he would be unable to be here Thursday night to inspect the company by reason of his accompanying Gov. Geer to Chicago, and the official inspection was again postponed. Capt. Metzner held the usual quarterly inspection however and the company made a most creditable appearance. It is understood that after Monday evening there will be quite a change in the company officers. Lieut. Scott Godfrey is now in Boise City, Idaho, and will tender his resignation, as will also Lieut. Willey. The vacancies will be filled by the promotion of Leighton Kelly and C. D. Clements. Capt. Metzner has under consideration plans for field work by the company that if arrangements can be made will prove most beneficial to the members.

In Bad Condition.—City Recorder Curry has completed a fine map of the city cemetery. The job was a most complicated one and necessitated an immense amount of labor and research into the musty archives of the dim past. The map shows the exact size and shape of every lot, the location of graves in each lot and the condition of graves. The work of investigating reveals the fact that many of the graves are in a most deplorable condition of neglect, for which there is almost no excuse at all, and should be attended to by those interested. Many of the lots show evidence of painstaking and loving care, and are really beautiful in their profusion of well kept shrubs and flowers. With the map Mr. Curry has also compiled a record of deeds, so that one can tell in a few minutes the exact condition of every lot in the cemetery and will prove a great convenience to purchasers.

FROM THE FAR NORTH. Mrs. W. H. McIntyre, a Former Resident of this County is Heard From.

SEAGWAY, Alaska, Sept. 24, Editor Enterprise: A word from the north may not be unwelcome to your many readers, now that the country has settled down after the return of the "Oregon Boys."

We have not had as much rain as is reported from Oregon, but still have had much more than last year, and it is still raining. The weather is not cold yet, and my garden is still full of flowers, but there is some snow on the mountains around Skagway. We spent several enjoyable weeks at White Pass, 12 miles above here, picking blueberries, which are fine and plentiful, and also got some red currants which are just like the cultivated ones at home, fully as large.

The White Pass and Yukon railroad is now completed to Lake Bennett and connects with the boats to Dawson. Gone are the hardships which formerly attended a trip to Dawson. The former struggle over an almost bottomless trail is over forever. To those with little money who prefer the trail, there is the wagon road to White Pass, and from there on the improved trail which offers little difficulty. Men walk from Lake Bennett to Skagway in one day. It is said that the water in the Yukon is reaching its low stage, and that the travel from Dawson out must stop until the ice forms. This will be a disappointment to many who are now getting ready to go in.

Wm. Matlock of Pendleton, and well known in Portland, and proprietor of the Skagway brewery here, started in at Dawson a few weeks since with a load of merchandise, and lost it all by the swamping of his scow, but with quick energy, he went to Seattle and again outfitted, and started for Dawson two days since.

Mr. McIntyre is now in Dawson, and likes what he has so far seen of the country. He will return in the spring and develop some mining property he owns at Ketchikan.

This town is constantly growing; building is going on rapidly and improving in quality.

The mining season closed at Atlin on the 15th of Sept., and a great many have come out for the winter. While the general opinion is that Atlin has not turned out to be as good as first reports indicated, still the yellow metal is there in sufficient quantity to encourage many to return another year when it is hoped the season will be longer and laws more favorable, the mining season the past summer, opening so late that practically little could be determined, and there was a great deal of confusion resulting from the passage of the alien law, which kept many of the claims from really being worked this year.
