U. S. Department of Agriculture.—The following data, covering a period of 27 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau records at Portland, Or. Month, November for 27 years.

TEMPERATURE.—Mean or normal temperature, 46 deg. The warmest month was that of 1860, with an average of 49 deg.

FROST.—The highest temperature was 73 deg on the 2nd, 1890. The lowest temperature was 11 deg. on the 27th, 1890.

PRECIPITATION.—(Rain and melted snow). Average for the month, 5.78 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 15.

CLOUDS AND WEATHER.—Average number of clear days, 6; partly cloudy days 9; cloudy days 15.

WIND.—The prevailing winds have been from the south. The highest velocity of the wind was 52 miles from the south on the 18th, 1897.

Humane Society Meeting.

The Clackamas County Humane Society held its first annual meeting Monday evening and elected officers as follows:

President, Miss Anita McCarver; vice-president, Geo. A. Harding; secretary, Rev. A. J. Montgomery; treasurer, E. G. Canfield; directors, W. E. Carl, J. E. Hedges, and H. C. Stevens were re-elected and W. A. Huntley was elected to fill the unexpired term of J. H. Smith, resigned.

The president reported as follows: This is the first annual meeting of the Clackamas County Humane Society. It is our duty on this occasion to report to the public what we are doing in the interest of humane work.

Article 2 of our constitution is as follows: "The object of this society is the prevention of cruelty to every living creature by all proper means including humane education."

There are United States laws and also laws in Oregon which are intended to provide penalties for cruelty to animals, to protect useful or harmless birds, etc. Copies of abstracts of these laws are published in the manual of the Oregon Humane Society.

This society was organized October 10, 1898. Since that time many important cases have been investigated and a number of animals humanely destroyed. A number of cases of cruelty to children have also been brought to our notice. It is our plan to seek the co-operation of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of Portland and secure its valuable aid when such cases are brought to us.

Last April the society sent out circulars to the principals of the public schools in Oregon City and vicinity, inviting competitive compositions from pupils of the schools on subjects pertaining to humane work. There were 69 competitors. All of these essays submitted without exception were meritorious and the work of writing them must prove beneficial both to writers and the cause of humane education.

The society is much hampered for want of funds. The annual membership fee is only 50 cents and we have less than thirty members on our roll. We earnestly call the attention of all benevolent citizens to the fact that we are obliged to neglect many portions of our work such as employing our officers designated the humane officers whose duty would be to look after cases of cruelty and report to the authorities and also furnishing literature to the school children which we regard as the most important part of our work. Will not some generous men and women become life members thereby increasing the needed and useful work of humane education, a work lying at the base of all other reforms?

The society is grateful for the generosity of two of its members, Dr. W. E. Carl and E. J. McKittrick for special prizes given by them to writers of essays. We are also under special obligations to the press for constant courtesies in their columns, and to the honorable members of the Oregon City Bank for the privilege of holding our meetings in their rooms.

The society does not hold itself above criticism, and we welcome all suggestions from those who have at heart our cause.
