IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE State of Oregon for the County of Clackamas.

Guaranty Savings and Loan Association, a corporation, plaintiff, vs. Robert E. Metcalf, Anna J. Foster and Newton Foster, her husband, Leulien McAllister and Garrison McAllister, her husband, Alice Lewis and Daniel Lewis, her husband, Mabel Shipman and George Shipman, her husband, William R. Metcalf, a minor, and William Sheahan, administrator of the estate with the will annexed of Julia Ann Metcalf, deceased, defendants.

To Robert E.
