THE LOCAL NEWS.

**No CLUES YET.**—In spite of a vigilant search the hold-up artists who operated in this vicinity a week ago have escaped detection.

**CITY CONVENTION.**—A call has been issued for a mass convention of the Independent Citizens of Oregon City to meet at Winward's hall on Tuesday evening, November 28th, at 7:30 to place in nomination a city ticket to be voted for at the annual election on Monday, Dec. 4.

**INQUIRY FOR LAND.**—In consequence of the cancellation of a large number of limited entries in the Oregon City and district the land office has been kept busy answering inquiries in regard to the same. Suitable homestead locations in this district are not plentiful and the demand for them is great.

**GAME FORTHWENT.**—The game of basket ball arranged for Wednesday evening between the Y. M. C. A. team of this city and a team from Milwaukie was postponed on account of the Milwaukie boys being unable to come on that date. The game will occur at a date to be decided upon in the near future.

**W. O. W. ELEC. OFFICERS.**—At the semi-annual election of the Woodmen of the World last Friday evening officers for the ensuing term were elected as follows: Council commander, S. S. Walker; advisory lieutenant, E. D. Kennedy; clerk, Grant Olds; banker, I. D. Taylor; manager, J. W. Boatman; executive, C. F. Buckler; watchman, J. H. Henth; wrentry, C. L. Gossler; musician, Prof. Betzel.

**A GOOD THING.**—The managers of the flouring mill at Aurora, the Hurst brothers, have been making a run on buckwheat flour. They have bought all the buckwheat in that section, or nearly all of it, and they have shipped away several car loads of the manufactured product. The growers of buckwheat have realized good prices, and no doubt the manufacturers have done very well. This is a branch of diversified farming that has been carried on for a long time in that section, and the experience of the past season demonstrates the fact that it pays farmers to not carry all their eggs to market in one basket.

**ANNUAL INSPECTION.**—Co. F., O. N. G. was out in force and looked their prettiest Monday evening. The occasion was the annual inspection, which should have occurred in September but was postponed through the absence of the inspecting officer. The inspection was highly creditable to the company and reflected credit upon Capt. Metzner, who has been untiring in his efforts to build up and maintain a militia company that is a credit to Oregon City. Outside of a few of the boys becoming slightly embarrassed in the presence of "company" everything went as smooth as the most critical could desire. Col. Jackson, U. S. A., inspector-general for the state of Oregon, conducted the inspection.

**ORGANIZATION EFFECTED.**—Oregon City again scores a point for get-up and hustle in being the first town in the state to organize a company of veterans of the Spanish and Filipino War. The organization was effected last Thursday at a meeting of the members of Co. I held in the armory. Officers were elected as follows: W. R. Logans, president; J. W. Moffat, vice-president; Lester P. Smith, secretary; G. W. Martin, treasurer. L. P. Smith, J. H. Black and J. B. Finley were appointed a committee to draw up a set of by-laws and regulations. Sociability and fraternity are the objects of the association. The company will become a part of the state organization perfected in Portland on Monday night.

**TO FENCE THE GRAVES.**—A basket social will be given in the Armory hall Saturday night by the members of Lawton Command, No. 1, Union Veteran's Union. The proceeds of the entertainment go to the fund that is being raised by the command to hunt up the last resting places in Clackamas county of all old soldiers and have them marked by a neat iron fence and otherwise taken care of. Many of the graves of these old battle scarred warriors are in a condition of bad neglect and the command proposes to see that they are suitably remembered. The general public are invited to assist in the good work by patronizing the social. A fine program has been prepared consisting of short speeches, solos, dialogues and recitations and will be followed by a dance.
