

## TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

Member Meeting Held at West Oregon City Saturday.

The November meeting of the Teachers' Association of Clackamas was held at the school building at West Oregon City Saturday, November 25, 1899. A goodly number of teachers and school parents and school officers were in attendance, and seldom has the association been favored with a more attentive audience.

Those in immediate charge of the incidental features of the meeting were Principal T. J. Gary and assistants, Mrs. Haines, Mrs. Byland and Miss Shipley. They made all visitors feel both at home and at ease.

Meeting called to order at 1 p.m. President N. W. Howland in the chair. Minutes of previous meeting read, corrected and accepted.

The program of the day was opened by the Association singing our national anthem, America, Mrs. Haines acting as captain.

Bell call, each teacher responding with a quotation.

"Biography of Wendell Phillips" was the title of a highly entertaining paper presented by J. W. Gray, of Parkplace school. The speaker spoke of the childhood, school days, early manhood, manliness and oratorical powers of Phillips. Of aristocratic lineage, and well in affluence, there was nothing in the birth of Phillips to incline him to great sympathy with the "down trodden" masses, particularly with the black masses, of whose condition he had no personal knowledge. However, made the acquaintance of Garrison, and within a year, at the sacrifice of funds, legal standing and social position, he enrolled himself in the unpopular ranks of abolition. He went through the country whenever he could find a few sympathizers and talked to people against slavery.

"School Libraries" was the subject assigned Mrs. Evans, of Oswego, who made an interesting paper on same. She referred to the great advantages of these libraries to the school and the community. Mrs. Evans said the establishing and maintaining of free libraries should be obligatory upon the state taxpayer as the public schools are. The speaker also referred to the library department of the "Womens' Club" saying that it would present to the next legislature a bill praying that a tax of 1 1/2 of a mill be levied for library purposes.

The notable event of the day was a very interesting and instructive number in the form of an eloquent lecture on "Turkey and the Turks" delivered by Mr. D. P. Thompson, of Portland, Ex-minister to Turkey. The speaker was thoroughly acquainted with his subject, having been the representative of our mission to the Turkish Empire at one time. All who know Mr. Thompson are aware of his rare powers of observation, and in this instance he seems to have noted down everything that came under the scope of his official vision, whilejourning in that Empire, relating to Turkish character, manners, and customs of the people and their educational system. His lecture proved of the greatest interest to all who heard it, and the Association showed their appreciation by tendering a vote of thanks to the lecturer.

After a most spirited afternoon session, a very excellent lunch was served by the patrons and pupils of the school, under the able management of Prof. T. J. Gary. All did ample justice to this delicious luncheon, and noted it was one of the best in the history of our Association.

After lunch was served an evening session took place, the principal feature of which was an illustrated lecture on "Toadstools" delivered by Prof. A. R. Fraser, of Pacific University, Forest Grove. The lecture was listened to throughout with marked attention. The speaker emphasized the importance of teachers becoming acquainted with "Mother Nature," stating that this would add much interest and life to all school work. Prof. Sweetser had with him many varieties of toadstools and fine views painted in water-colors, and used these in explaining his highly instructive lecture.

The December meeting of the association was then discussed at some length. On account of the Christmas holidays a motion was made and seconded that this meeting be omitted. Said motion was carried.
