

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

The December Session Devoted to the Transaction of Routine Business.

The city council met in regular session Wednesday evening with all members except Councilman Charman in attendance.

F. H. Beach petitioned for the privilege of purchasing the old street lamp that used to decorate the front of the city hall.

W. B. Shiveley appeared before the council petitioning for an annual theatre license. Under the present system it is necessary to obtain a license for every performance and an annual license would render it much more convenient for the opera house management.

E. Mathies and others, presented a petition in regard to the arc light at the corner of Main and Eighth streets. It was set forth that for some time past the petitioners had paid the expense of the light and they now asked the city to assume the expense of maintenance on the ground that the light has become of public benefit and a necessity.

Chief Engineer Mason presented his quarterly report. During the quarter ending Nov. 30th, there were no fire alarms; all the hose in the department was tested at from 80 to 100 pounds pressure and 2500 feet found in good condition.

The recorder's report showed burial permits issued: Golden Hill, Chas. M. Warnock, Margaret Ferguson, Unknown and Mrs. Frances Caldwell. \$422.33 was received during the month from licenses, etc. \$29.00 was received from subscription to the Falls View sidewalk.

Councilman Schuebel introduced by request of the parties interested, an ordinance reducing the width of an alley on the hill. It was read the first time and ordered published.

The finance committee reported favorably upon a large number of claims against the city and they were ordered paid.

The recorder was instructed to draw warrants for the judges and clerks of election.

The council then proceeded to canvass the votes cast at the recent election. The result was found to be as announced elsewhere in this issue.

It was voted to dispense with the services of Mr. Dickelman in cleaning Main street during the winter. The work will be done under the direction of the street department.
