

DEATH OF JOHN MYERS.

A Pioneer of Oregon City Dies Suddenly at his Home in Portland.

John Myers, a former pioneer of Oregon City but of late an esteemed citizen of Portland, died at his home in that city Wednesday, January 17th. His health had been failing for several months, but his sudden end was entirely unexpected and came as a great blow to his friends.

Mr. Myers was born in Missouri in 1830 and crossed the plains in 1852. He settled in California where he resided until 1860 when he moved to Oregon and settled in Oregon City where he engaged in business and continued until 1888 when he moved to Portland where he resided until his death. During his long residence in Clackamas county Mr. Myers was a prominent member of the democratic party and in 1868 was elected sheriff. Following his term as sheriff he elected to represent Clackamas county in the state senate for the sessions of 1872, 1874, 1876, 1878 and 1880. In 1888 he was appointed U. S. marshal for Oregon by President Cleveland, when he took up his residence in Portland and became prominent in the political, commercial and social life of that city. During his residence in this city he served as president of the board of trade and was instrumental in securing the construction of the first bridge across the Willamette river.

Mr. Myers was a Mason of many years standing and had frequently served as master of the lodges in which he held his membership. He was known throughout the state, and was at one time a candidate for congress on the democratic ticket, being defeated by only a small majority.

He leaves a wife and ten children, of whom Mrs. L. P. Williams, Mrs. R. B. Beattie and Joseph R. Myers, are residents of this county. The other children reside in Portland and Tacoma.

OREGON CITY'S FEDERAL BUILDING

A Bill Introduced in Congress Appropriating \$60,000 for one in this City.

Postmaster Horton has received from the postoffice department a copy of a bill introduced in congress appropriating \$60,000 for the construction of a federal building in Oregon City for the accommodation of the postoffice and land office. Mayor Latourette has been active in bringing the matter to the attention of the department and through his efforts the officials have been furnished with reports of the amount of business transacted in the land and postoffice, the amount paid for rents and other items showing the necessity for such a building here.

In the notice from the department Mr. Horton is called upon to furnish further information. Among the figures showing the increase in ten years, is given the postal receipts for the fiscal year June 30, 1889, \$2,910.14 as compared with \$6,322.71 for year ending June 30, 1899. The population in 1889 was 2500 while in 1899 it was 6000. The commercial and manufacturing interests are also shown.

The land office shows that at present the business is transacted by four regular employees and that five rooms are used, while at least 50 per cent additional room is required for the convenience and efficiency of the office. Particular stress is laid on the fact that the office has no suitable vault room for preserving the valuable records and none can be secured. The cash receipts of \$40,000 for the past six months is a strong factor as showing the volume of business transacted.
