Pioneer Laid to Rest.

The funeral of the Hon. John Myers, a pioneer of Oregon City, was held from St. Paul's Episcopal church, Friday last at 12 o'clock.

Mr. Myers until his removal to Portland, was a leading member of St. Paul's church, contributing most generously to its support and never missing the church services when it was possible to attend.

The services were conducted by the Rev. George B. VanWaters of St. David's church, Portland, assisted by the Rev. P. K. Hammond, the rector of St. Paul's. The simple yet beautiful service was most impressive and began with the singing of the hymn, "In the Hour of Trial, Jesus Plead for Me." The other music consisted of the chant from the Burial office and the hymns, "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Thy Will be Done." by the choir, supplemented with a solo by Prof. J. A. Epping, of Portland, "Come to Me." The church was crowded with friends from here and Portland who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to one whom they had loved as relative and friend. Multnomah Lodge No. 1, A. F. & A. M. marched to the church in a body and took charge of the services at the grave. The following Masons were the pallbearers: Penumbra Kelly, Charles R. Frazier and John Becker, of Portland; Judge T. A. McBride, George A. Harding and J. P. Lovett, of Oregon City. The casket was covered with handsome floral pieces, sent by his mourning friends. One of the best of men, possessed of great natural force and ability, he has left his mark for good, wherever he lived and leaves behind him a memory of kindness and good deeds.
