A Shady Transfer.

Circumstances point to sensational developments in the matter of the commitment of George Root, formerly of Clackamas county, to the insane asylum, from Clatsop county lately.

Some years ago Root, who is over 60 years of age, deeded his 80 acre farm at Needy, to one Harry Cochran, who had agreed, it is said, to take care of the maker of the deed during his life time. In July, 1899, Mr. Cochran preferred a charge of insanity against Root. Judge Thomas Ryan, of Clackamas county, examined the patient and found him sane and Cochran was instructed to continue taking care of the old man as formerly. G. W. Church was appointed as legal guardian over Root's affairs.

In November a third person accompanied Cochran to the courthouse and the two swore out another warrant for the arrest of Root on a charge of insanity; the judge refused to entertain the complaint unless the same was indorsed by the guardian. Recently, it is said, without the consent of the guardian, the ward was removed to Clatsop county. There the old charge of insanity was tried again, this time successfully, and Root was committed to the asylum.

Parties familiar with the case have said that witnesses can be produced to swear that George Root signed the deed to his farm while under the influence of an intimidating character.—Telegram.

Guilty, or Not Guilty?

A. W. Hertka, of Portland, is now under \$100 bonds to appear before Justice Schoebel next Friday, and answer a charge of practicing medicine without a license. About three weeks ago he began the treatment of Mrs. S. B. Quint, of Gladstone, aged 63, who was then suffering from Bright's disease, through the medium of Christian Science.

Mrs. Quint died last Friday and the doctors refusing to make a certificate of the cause of her death, a coroner's jury was summoned who rendered the following verdict:

"We, the jury summoned to inquire into the death of Mrs. S. B. Quint, find she came to her death prematurely for want of medical treatment and misplaced confidence in the so-called Christian Scientist practitioner, A. W. Hertka.
