It may be stated that the weakening of the Kentucky republicans was due to the influence of the national administration. It is realized that the seating of Goebel by the legislature was an act of outrageous injustice, but it is also held that it is better for the people to submit to such acts when perpetrated by color of law, than to plunge the state into revolution. It has not been so many years ago since New York went through a somewhat similar occurrence, the legislature being stolen for Senator D. B. Hill by aid of a deliberately partisan judge. For a time the steal seemed a triumph, but in a few years the revolution of feeling gave the state to the republicans. So it is hoped that it will be in Kentucky. Republicans think, too, that Governor Taylor made a serious mistake in defying the courts and in the methods he pursued. Even if the lower courts are partisan and decide against him, as he claims that they were certain to do, he has the right of appeal to the supreme court of the state and thence to the federal courts. The supreme court of Kentucky consists of four democrats and three republicans and during the campaign last November, decided a political case in favor of the republicans. It is therefore unjust to denounce it as rapidly partisan. Further, although a Kentucky governor is elected for four years, a lieutenant governor, who succeeds to that office, can only hold it until the next general election. Governor Beckham will therefore hold office, at the most, only until next November, when Taylor can appeal to the people.
