THE BIG BLUFF ROAD

An Offer to Construct the County's Part for \$3,000

The article in last week's Enterprise headed the "Big Bluff Road," has attracted wide attention and called forth the following communications from Hon. C. D. Latourette and F. S. Baker, respectively:

C. D. LATOURETTE.

I am in favor of the road projected from the southern end of the town. It would be worth many times its cost, both to the city and county, as it would open up a scope of territory now practically inaccessible. Oregon City should be the best market in the state for wood, wheat and timber, with good roads leading out in every direction, business would be stimulated and increased. I sincerely hope that political conditions may not be allowed to stand in the way of this or any other legitimate road project. The city authorities will meet the county court half way, and with the subscriptions of private parties already pledged, there should be no failure.

In looking over the correspondence in the enterprise in regard to the proposed road in the south end of Oregon City, I notice that Senator Geo. C. Brownell estimates the county's part at from \$10,000 to \$28,000. At the request of some of the leading parties interested, I went over the proposed road, and found 1,335 feet within the city limits, and about one mile outside of the city which the county would have to build.

Now, I will make a definite proposition for the county's part. I will grade the entire road-bed, 16 feet wide, on a six percent grade, with stone culverts at water courses, and necessary ditches on upper side to properly drain road-bed, for \$3,000 and give a good and sufficient bond to build said road according to the Meldrum survey and profile, which I have carefully examined.

Mysterious Disappearance.

Any information that would lead to the whereabouts of Ben Hendrickson, who so mysteriously disappeared from his home at Mount Pleasant, on the night of Feb. 15, will be kindly received by his relatives and friends.

Mrs. Hendrickson tells the story of his disappearance as follows:

"About 7:30 o'clock last Thursday evening Mr. Hendrickson started for his brother's home, which is but a short distance, to procure an incubator. At 11 o'clock he had not returned and becoming alarmed, I went to see what had detained him. Ascertaining he had not been there, we at once instituted a diligent search, visiting the residents of the community, but could find absolutely no trace of him."

Sheriff Cook and Chief Burns were notified, but as yet have been unable to trace him any further than Brown's school house. Foul play is not expected as he had no money on his person at the time of his disappearance. He had complained recently of severe pains in his head, and it is thought that while in a demented condition, he wandered away.

Chief Burns has distributed posters which describes Hendrickson as being about 5 feet 7 inches in height, weight 150 pounds, short grayish beard, dark complexioned, attired in duck coat, blue overalls, slouch hat and heavy shoes; about 53 years old.
