THE LOCAL NEWS.

INCIDENT BLAZE.—10:30 o'clock Friday night found the boys in Johnson's barber shop fighting like demons to hold the fire king at bay. The building had caught fire in the apartment from an overheated water pipe, but by some lively hustling they soon had it under control, with slight damage. No alarm was given.

FIRE ALARM.—The department, Fountain Hose Company, No. 1, and Columbia Hook and Ladder Company, responded to an alarm of fire Saturday afternoon, and found the cause to be a burning chimney in the residence of Charles Wright. The fire apparatuses were housed without being called into service, as the chimney soon burned itself out.

HORSES ARE SCARCER.—Julius Moreland, who is buying horses for Smith, Davis & Co., contractors on the Northern Pacific, came down from Seattle last Saturday and returned Wednesday. He states that horses in general are much cheaper in Washington than in Oregon. Buying mules in this section of the county is out of the question, and he also states that he offered as high as \$350 for teams in Oregon City but could not purchase.

OREGON CITY LEATHER.—A piece of first leather ever manufactured in this city was given to the Enterprise yesterday. It was made by J. W. Brown, who recently arrived from Salt Lake, to superintend the tannery which is connected with the woolen mills. The leather manufactured is of a high grade, and can be made up into anything from a purse to a shoe.

CANDIDATES INITIATED.—Seventy-five candidates as Master Workmen at East Portland lodge, of A. O. U. W., Wednesday evening. Arrangements were made for a late car to leave Portland after the ceremonies, and a large delegation from this city and county were in attendance. They report a most enjoyable evening, and the initiation a howling success.

NEW ROAD.—A. L. Larkins, of Meadow Brook, called on the Enterprise last Monday and among other things said: "We have raised \$800 by private subscription, and the county offers \$800 more to use in the construction of a road between the Molalla road and Meadowbrook. A portion of the road will simply be repaired, while the part from Molalla road to Union Mills will be new. Work will commence in early spring.

STRICKEN WITH APOPLEXY.—The many friends of John Shadle will be pained to learn of the sad accident that befell him last Monday afternoon. While decorating Willamette hall for the reception to be given by Meade W. R. C., he was stricken with apoplexy and fell from a step-ladder to the floor, where he was discovered in an unconscious condition by his wife. He remained in a semi-conscious condition until late Wednesday afternoon, and the attending physicians, Doctors Strickland and Seaman, entertain serious doubts as to his ultimate recovery.

A CHANGE.—Miss Nannie Paddock, for many years the official stenographer and typist in the office of the Oregon hospital for the insane, has resigned that position, and accepted a similar one with President Frank Strong of the University of Oregon, at Eugene. She leaves Thursday for that place to assume the duties of her new position. Miss Jessie Creighton, of this city, an expert stenographer and typist, who served in that position in the office of Prof. G. M. Irwin, superintendent of public instruction, during that officer's term has been appointed to succeed Miss Paddock. —Salem Statesman. Miss Paddock is a daughter of J. C. WANTED IN WASHINGTON.—Last Tuesday Chief of Police Burns placed under arrest one H. W. Wilson, A. R. Lake and a dozen other aliases, who is wanted in Washington for cattle stealing. He claims to have come to Oregon City about the first of January, and since that time has been working at different jobs about town, assisting in placing the shelving in Robinson's new store, The Fair, Sheriff Edward Deggeter, of Lewis county, arrived in this city Wednesday and identified him as the man wanted, and will proceed at once to Salem, where he will seek requisition papers from Gov. Geer, permitting him to transfer Wilson to Washington. The sheriff states that numerous other charges will be lodged against the prisoner upon his arrival in that state.

Geer on Elections.

Governor Geer has received a letter from Prof. J. M. Shaw, Guachita college, Arkadelphia, Ark., asking the following questions:

"If you think that the legislative election of United States Senators is more corrupt in your state than the popular election of other officers, please reply."

This Governor Geer replied: "I do not believe Oregon has ever had a United States senator whose election was secured by the use of money. I do not recall that it has ever been charged, even by those who were politically opposed to the successful candidate. The objection to the system of legislative election is the opportunity it furnishes for help-ups, dead-locks and the prevention of any election at all. Assuming that by the word 'corrupt' you mean the use of money it may be said that Oregon has never had a corrupt popular election. At any rate, popular government has no resting place whatever, if its interests cannot be confided to the keeping of the common people."
