A Tragedy of Mont Blanc.

The story of the destruction of the baths of St. Gervals at the foot of Mont Blanc, in 1892, is told in "The Annals of Mont Blanc." This was one of the culamities that could scarcely have been predicted or averted.

Owing to the stoppage of the subglacial drainage, in some way never ascertained, a lake was formed under the Tote Rousse glacier, in which an Oregon, April, 12, 1900, and 15 delegates to enormous body of water was pent up at a spot 10,000 feet above the sea levrl. Between 1 and 2 o'clock on the night of July 12, 1892, the ice that had held the lake gave way.

The water swept in a torrent of tremendous force over the Desert de Pierre Ronde, gathering up thousands of tons of rock and stones in its course. hamlet of Bionnassay, which it did not injure, destroyed half the village of Bionnay on the highroad between Contamines and St. Gervais and, tearing up trees as it went along, joined the main river of the Bon-Nant.


