Call For County Convention.

The Republican Convention for Clackamas County, Oregon, is hereby called to meet in the Armory, Oregon City, on Wednesday, the 28th day of March, 1900, at the hour of nine o'clock, a. m. for the purpose of electing 15 delegates to the State Republican convention, to be held in Portland, Oregon, April, 12, 1900, and 15 delegates to the Congressional Republican Convention of the First district, to be held at Me Minnville, Oregon, April 10, 1900; also for the purpose of nominating 3 representatives for the legislature, 2 county commissioners, sheriff, clerk, recorder, assessor, treasurer, surveyor, school superintendent, coroner and justices of the peace, constables and road supervisors of the different precincts.

The convention shall consist of 143 delegates, apportioned to the several precincts as follows, said apportionments being based on one delegate at large for each precinct and one delegate for every 20 votes and major fraction cast for T. T. Gear for governor at the last state election:

The primaries for the election to the said convention will be held in the several precincts at the usual voting places on Saturday, March 24th, and at the following hours:

The judges and clerks of said primary elections shall be appointed by the committeemen of the respective precincts. A copy of the credentials of the delegates elected to the County Convention shall be forwarded to the secretary of the County Central Committee in time to have the same filed before the hour of 8 a. m. March 28, 1900. Each precinct shall be represented in the county convention by duly elected delegates in person or by residents of the same precincts holding proxies of said delegates, and not otherwise.
