THE administration deplors the decision of the senate to amend the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, and contends that the amendment proposed will be worse than useless, in that it will subject this government to the necessity of maintaining fleets of warships at the mouths of the canal to defend it whenever the United States is at war. Naturally, none of the powers will agree that the United States may "defend" the canal and use in time of war without reserving to themselves the right to attack it. If the configuration of the ground were such as to permit the canal to be defended by fortresses and if Great Britain would consent to our building these, it would be different, but under the circumstance, the administration thinks that the amendment is a great mistake.
