POLITICAL POT

It Boils Out Candidates From Constable to Congressman.

GEORGE C. BROWNELL ENDORSED.

C. M. Toole, J. L. Kruse and John Talbert for Representatives—A. S. Dresser for Joint Representative Clackamas and Multnomah.

The fight is on. The big political guns of Clackamas county were booming all day Wednesday, and when the sun went down, democracy had been routed from its kopjes, and free silver and anti-expansion were forever silenced in this vicinity. It was republican convention day, and the gathering of the clans was as harmonious as the peaceful meeting of many waters.

Chairman Bradley called the convention to order, and after a few brief remarks, A. S. Dresser was made temporary chairman. G. B. Dimick was chosen secretary with Albert Cossen as assistant secretary.

Altogether, it was one of the most satisfactory conventions ever held in this county, and everybody departed from it, even the defeated candidates, with the full determination of making Clackamas county speak, and speak in no uncertain tones, for the grandest republican victories ever chronicled to her credit.

Chairman Dresser proceeded to appoint committees on credentials, platform, and permanent organizations and order of business, which made subsequent reports as follows:

Pending the report of the other committees, J. U. Campbell was called for by the delegates, and he came forward and told them he wanted to save all his campaign fodder for the coming campaign, and they kindly excused him.

The committee reported the following platform, which was unanimously adopted:

"We, the delegates assembled in the Republican County Convention this day, reaffirm our allegiance to the principles of the Republican party, and hereby endorse the administration of President McKinley.

"We congratulate the people of this country and state upon the redemption of the promises made by the President and the Republican party in the campaign of 1896, to uphold and maintain the gold standard as our standard of values.

"We endorse the course of the Administration in relation to maintaining the American flag over every part of territory taken during what is known as the Spanish War, and say that wherever and whenever our flag has been nailed to the cross by our soldier boys, that no man or party shall ever haul it down.

"We hereby congratulate the people of this county and state upon the patriotism and self-sacrifice manifested by the boys of the Second Oregon in promptly answering the call of President McKinley and upholding him and his administration in the Spanish War. We particularly congratulate our people upon the magnificent record of the private soldier as well as of officers of this regiment, not only when in camp, but on the field of battle as well.

"We hereby declare that we favor a just and honest economy in all of the county offices and in the administration of county affairs, and favor the letting of all the county printing to the lowest bidder under contract.

"We hereby approve the actions of our members of the Legislative Assembly of 1899 in passing the Initiative and Referendum amendment to the State Constitution, and hereby declare that our representatives will favor its submission to the people by the next Legislative Assembly.

"We hereby declare that we favor a conservative and economical expenditure of the county funds, and insist upon as low taxation as is consistent with a

C H Dye, J L Kruse, C M Toole, John Talbert, E M Hartman, John Meldrum, and Wm Welch were placed in nomination. There being 144 delegates, 73 ballots were necessary to a choice.

RECORDER.
Tom P Randall, present incumbent, was the unanimous choice of the convention without opposition.

CLERK.
E P Carter and W M Shank were placed in nomination, Mr. Shank winning on the first ballot, 100 to 44.

ASSESSOR.
Eli Williams was the only aspirant for this office and was given the unanimous vote of the convention.

H A Webster was nominated for justice of district No 3, with F T Talbert as constable.

J U Campbell was elected chairman of the central committee. G B Dimick was chosen secretary.
